COUNTY COURT OF ST. JOHN.—In the case of Jack vs. B. H. Foley, of Buctouche, an action brought to recover premiums of insurance paid by plaintiff for defendant, in which a verdict was given for plaintiff, last week, C. A. Stockton moved that a verdict be entered for defendant, pursuant to leave reserved, or that the plaintiff be nonsuited, or that a new trial be granted. G. G. Gilbert, Q. C., argued contra. Judgment reserved.

STIPENDIARY'S COURT.—The hearing of George W. Robertson on the complaint of Samuel L. Storer for an alleged breach of trust in fraudulently disposing of the schooner Henry Swan, before Stipendiary Richardson last Friday and Saturday excited more than usual interest. The complainant and defendant were members of the late firm of Robertson & Co. Mr. Storer being a citizen of the United States could not register the vessel in his own name and she was accordingly registered in the name of Mr. Robertson. About a month ago some difficulties arose between the members of the firm, and Mr. Robertson transferred the vessel to Mr. O. Smith in order, as he alleges, to pay the firm's debts, for which he was being pressed. The stipendiary while regretting that he was not in a position to receive and consider certain documents which might throw more light on the matter decided that as there was evidence of the transfer of the vessel without Mr. Storer's knowledge or consent he would send the case up where the matters in dispute could be thoroughly inquired into.

KENT COUNTY POLITICS AND NAMES.—The New York Morning Advertiser says:—William O. McInerney, of the Police Bureau, is considerably interested in an election for the Dominion Parliament, which will be held in Kent County, New Brunswick, in a few days. His brother, George V. McInerney, who had the honor of being a candidate for Parliament when he was twenty-one years old, is running as an independent in a three-cornered contest. He expects to defeat the Tory and the Grit candidates. In a letter received yesterday Mr. McInerney was informed that things were looking all right in Richibucto, the county seat where he lives and also in the towns of Kouchibouguac, Kouchibouguac, Mahaloudane and Buctouche. The people of Neguac, Shediac, Memramcook, Aboushigan, Quispamsis, Scadou, Nauwigewank and Tabusintac, towns in the neighboring counties, are watching the struggle and betting on the result. Mr. McInerney has been a candidate for Parliament six times, but was not once successful. If he wins in this election there will be a demonstration in his honor in Richibucto.

A stock list is now being prepared and a large quantity of stock is being guaranteed. The very depressed state of the building trade in the U. S. this season, the present depression at home and the want of capital, caused the operations to be stopped early in the season and induced those interested to form a company with sufficient capital to tide over a crisis of this kind when it again occurs. Mr. Stevens aims to pay all liabilities in full and let the company start with a clean sheet.—Times.
