GENERAL NEWS.

Mr. Schreiber has assumed control as deputy minister and chief engineer of railways and canals. Similarly Mr. Pottinger commences his duties as manager of the Intercolonial railway.

The London Chronicle announces a formal reconciliation has been effected between Mr. Gladstone and Labouchere. Gladstone visited Mr. and Mrs. Labouchere yesterday and took tea with them.

Goldwin Smith has accepted the post of honorary president of the Continental Union Association of Toronto. In his letter of acceptance Mr. Smith says his love of motherland impels him to accept the position.

In July, 1887, collector Atwood of Shelburne, N. S., seized the American ship Bridgewater for violation of the customs laws. She was detained eighty-seven days. The owner now brings suit against the collector for detaining and claims \$52,000.

Despatches say that news has been received from Samoa to the effect that the native insurgents have attacked the English residents. Orders were telegraphed to the commander of the Australian squadron to send the warship Bingaroama to Apia without delay.

Immigration agent Gardner of St. John has received notice that his services will not be required after the end of this year. It is reported that the change is due to a reorganization of the service, and that the office as a part of the machinery of the department of agriculture or of the interior is to be abolished.

A movement for the emigration of negroes from the Southern States to South America has been revived and officers of Kansas Freedom's Relief Association are preparing for the wholesale emigration of negroes for Brazil. Congress will be asked to aid the movement in the interests of a solution of the negro question.

The Canadian Government has consulted the Marquis of Ripon on a projected commercial treaty between Canada and Mexico, the former allowing the free importation of Mexican raw sugar, cotton and tobacco in exchange for the free importation into Mexico of Canadian wheat and flour, manufactured cottons and woollens and machinery.

It is reported that Premier DeBoucherville personally objects to Hon. Mr. Chapleau being appointed governor of the province of Quebec, and declares that he will resign if such appointment should take place. The two leaders have been unfriendly since the premier opposed the sale of the North Shore railway. Mr. Chapleau has, however, informed his friends that he will open the next session of the legislature.

The following is the special cable to the Globe, dated London, Nov. 29: The proceedings when the Canadian portrait of Gladstone will be presented to the National Liberal Club, on Dec. 12th, promise to be of universal interest. Lord Rosebery's presidency of the dinner is regarded as a special honor, and this, combined with Mr. Blake's presence to hand over the gift, will secure a very influential

company.

Sir William Whiteway, Premier of Newfoundland, left Toronto last Wednesday morning on his return to St. John's. Before going he stated that the statement which has appeared in some of the newspapers, to the effect that formal and semi-official exchange of opinion had taken place between the Canadian representatives and those from the province of Newfoundland on the subject of confederation at the recent Halifax convention, were entirely without foundation.

Two tribes of Indians in the western portion of Vancouver Island are engaged in warfare as the result of a supply of whiskey of which they have in some way become possessed. The lighthouse keeper at that point is shut up with his daughter in the lighthouse in a state of siege. They have telegraphed for a man-of-war to be sent to quell the fighting and the revenue cutter "Quadra" with fifty policemen has been despatched to the scene of the trouble.

Henry Fanning, of Halifax, has retained George H. Fielding to have the will of his late wife attacked. It will be alleged that at the time the deceased made her will she was of unsound mind. The will among other bequests had the following: To Pope Leo XIII, \$400; to Rev. Gerald Murphy, \$200; to Archbishop O'Brien, to be expended for St. Mary's cathedral; \$200; to the Immaculate Home of St. Joseph's Union, New York, \$500; to the Little Sisters of the Poor at Boston, \$100.

W. H. Fuller of Ottawa, who was in the states during the presidential campaign, gives the press the following letter received from a democrat of New York: 'I have no doubt that the democrat congress will take a broad view of the question in regard to reciprocity with Canada and be very liberal in its treatment of the matter, resulting in a closer and more intimate connection with our neighbours in the north, for I am certain that it is the feeling of what Lincoln used to call the "plain people" of this country—to be good friends with your "people."'

The "Myrtle Navy" tobacco is not burdened with the usual costs which swell the price of most articles to the consumer, the firm employ no travellers whatever, their orders come to them instead of being sought by them. The merchant does not require to keep a large stock on hand swelling its price with interest, for the factory is an immediate source of supply to him, at the cost of a postal card or at most a telegram. He loses nothing, therefore from being overstocked. The article is a staple one, for which there is as constant a demand as for wheat or flour, and the merchant can, therefore, sell it at the minimum rate of profit.

"Would you prefer me to marry your daughter here or in Canada?" asked the cashier pleasantly.

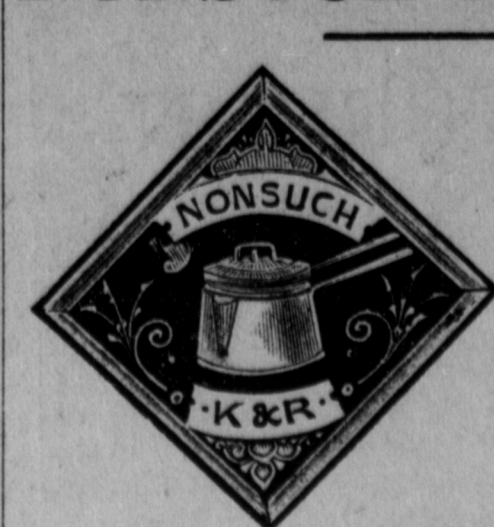
"I—I—" began the old man, rather startled; "I—Marry her here my boy! Marry her here! I'd rather have you in this country."
