Miss Lizzie Tweedy will pay Waltham, Mass., a flying visit during the Xmas holidays.

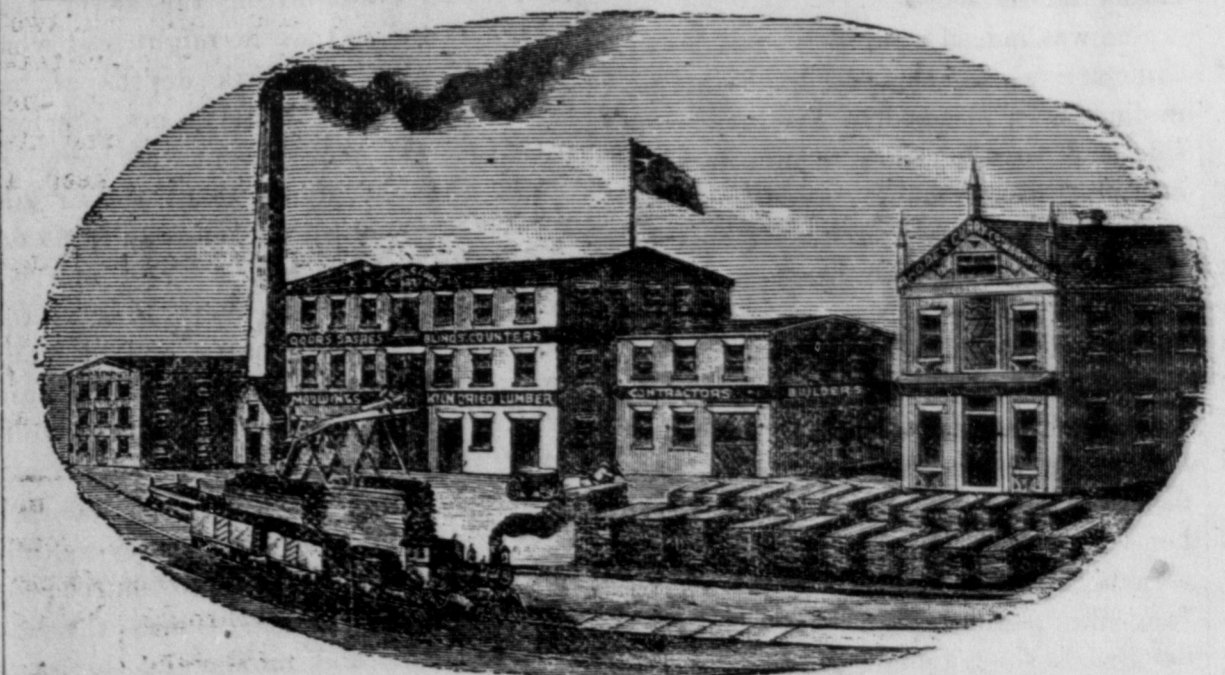
