## SENTENCED!

Buck Sentenced to be Hanged on December 1st, While Jim Gets 25 Years in Penitentiary.

DORCHESTER, Sept. 22.—Judge Fraser passed sentence upon the prisoners Jim and Buck at 12.30 o'clock this morning.

Attorney-General Blair moved for judgment in the case of the Queen vs. Jim and the prisoner was brought in.

His Honor Judge Fraser: Prisoner in dock stand up.

You have been indicted by the grand jury of this county for having on the 1st day of August in the year of 1892 at the city of Moncton feloniously and unlawfully discharge a loaded pistol, loaded with powder and ball at Joseph E. Steadman with intent and malice aforethought to kill and murder. The different counts in the indictment were read. Judge Fraser resuming said: You were put on your trial and was defended by able counsel. The charges were submitted to a jury of this county and after careful consideration they have found you guilty of four of the indictments. The indictments were then read and his honor resumed: Prisoner at the bar you are yet a young man but from all we can learn your career has been one of crime. How long you have been roaming over this part of the Dominion or adjoining republic we do not know. All we know is that from what has come to our knowledge you are one of a band of robbers and burglars and murderers, who are travelling throughout the length and breadth of this land committing crimes, even taking human life if it stood in the way of success of your plans. Your comrade, Robert Olsen, has been found guilty of the murder of Jos. E. Steadman. You have to be thankful that you do not stand for the same crime. I say had it not been for the courage and promptness of the officer who arrested you, you would probably stand in the dock in another county for the murder of that officer. You had it in your heart according to the statement of Mr. Carroll and others; and from the confession of your lips you had it in your heart to take another's life. I do not know that you have taken a human life. Your comrade stands convicted of murder. Evidence has been produced that you have been travelling about the country with burglars and murderers and it is time the law laid hold of this class of persons of whom you appear to be one. I do not know what I can say to you to help you to change the course you have pursued. During the course of the trial you have not shown the slightest compunction for your crime. You might have been found guilty of the more serious charge in the indictment, but in mercy towards you the crown did not press the jury to finding that indictment. I need not recall the circumstances on that night at the Donnelly house. The evidence bears out the conclusion that you well knew that night at the Donnelly house, although you may not have heard the signal, that when your comrade came out the officers were there to arrest you. It is true that the shot which came from your pistol did not take Steadman's life, but you had murder in your heart. When you drew the revolver you had murder in your heart. It now becomes necessary for me to pass upon you the sentence for the crime for which the jury have convicted you.

Prisoner—Excuse me, will you allow me to make a statement.

Judge Fraser—Certainly.

Jim—I would like for you to bear patiently with me for a moment. I probably know more about this than any other man. According to the evidence of the officers, or the marshal, that house was surrounded by officers. The street in front of the house was crowded with spectators, people who had followed up the officers intending to witness what took place. We were both seen coming out of the same door at the same moment. It seems strange that during all this affair no one of the officers or spectators saw Jim. They all saw Buck. One witness, I don't know his name, says he took up a position to command a view of both doors. He says during the shooting he saw the door on the platform open and shut again. That man saw it open because I had my eye on it. I saw the man who appeared there and recognized him when I ran up against him a second later. Three of the officers saw Jim that night. I know that for a certainty; they ran up against him. It is strange these officers all swore they did not see Jim. There must have been some reasons to suppress the fact. They knew they made no effort to arrest him. One reason is that if they admitted they saw me and did not attempt to capture me they would be charged with cowardice which would be a serious charge to make against any man. It seems the court has admitted that I probably did not know that the officers were in the house. I did not. There were more witnesses than one who saw the door open. At the time of Buck's arrest I had a 32 calibre revolver in my hand. I made away with that revolver when I found that it was a 32 that had taken Steadman's life. If I had been arrested I have no doubt in the least but that I now would be occupying a cell in the position of that unfortunate man over there. I know the court has the power to impose a long term of imprisonment on me, and I know that during those years I shall be buried alive behind those walls. If these officers denied seeing Jim, from this very reason they would


