Slain by Eagles.
OGDEN, Utah, Nov. 5.—J. F. Barkelow and Frank N. Conroy, of Brooklyn, N. Y., left here to examine the territory of the extinct cave dwellers along Nine Mile Creek. Barkelow returned yesterday and tells a horrible story of Conroy's death. Conroy fell while they were picking their way along the edge of a cliff overhanging what looked like a bottomless gorge. He lay on a jutting platform below out of reach of immediate rescue, with several ribs broken, and one arm smashed.

He had promised to lay quiet while Barkelow went for assistance, when Barkelow heard a scream. Looking down he saw his injured friend attacked by two eagles, who struck at him with their bills and claws. At last they reached his face, and Conroy staggered and fell backward over the edge of the shelf, his screaming foes following him into the abyss.

Fatal Election Row.
FREDERICTON, Nov. 5.—Word comes from Andover that a young man named Kelly is under arrest at that place, charged with committing an assault which caused the death of one Walter Scott, aged about 35, a popular young man of the place, who was the only support of his widowed mother and sisters. The circumstances of the sad affair are as follows: On the night of the election, Kelly, who had been drinking considerably, got into an altercation with deceased, which terminated in the former hitting Scott with a weapon about the body, and finally felling him to the ground with a blow on the head. The deceased was taken to his home in an unconscious condition, and died six days afterwards. The deceased was buried a day or two after his death, and no proceedings having been taken against his assailant, the authorities then took the matter in hand. The body was disinterred, and a post-mortem examination made, which disclosed a severe wound in the head, the skull, it is said, having been crushed in, and a wound also in one of the wrists. The examining physician reported that death was caused by blood poisoning, resulting from erysipelas induced by the wrist wound. The wound in the head was pronounced not sufficient to cause death.
