THE CANAL TOLLS DIFFICULTY.

The conclusion reached by the Dominion Government to continue the canal toll rebate system until the end of the present season and then abolish it altogether is one that should be acceptable to all parties interested. In Canada there appears to be a difference of opinion as to the proper course to pursue in the matter.

No better selection could have been made than Chicago in fixing upon a location for the World's Fair. Representatives of almost every nation of the globe will be able to converse there in their own language with their own countrymen.

Two years ago when the United States Congress was strongly Republican in both branches an attempt was made to pass an act providing for federal control elections in certain localities. The avowed object of the act was to prevent election frauds in the Southern States where it was claimed the votes of the negroes were fraudulently counted out by white returning officers.

The Tory government of Great Britain has been dismissed and the grand old man is again at the helm, but apparently all is not plain sailing with him. The Radical section of his crew is said to be on the verge of mutiny. It appears that Mr. Gladstone had determined to take Mr. Labouchere into his cabinet, but when the Queen was informed of this decision she refused point blank to receive the clever editor of Truth as one of her advisers.

Latest reports from the Dominion capital are to the effect that Premier Abbott's

health is completely broken down. His physicians have ordered him to quit work altogether and it is intimated that he will be compelled to resign the leadership and retire from public life altogether.

The school question is keeping things lively in Manitoba and the North West. In Manitoba the Roman Catholics have resolved to keep up their separate schools in defiance of the new school act.

The Tennessee convict war is about ended, but not before some blood has been spilled and a great amount of property destroyed. The practice has been in that state to hire out convict labor to the highest bidder, many of the convicts being put to work in the mines.

A rumor is in circulation throughout the county that Judge Landry will resign his seat on the County Court Bench and contest this constituency at the coming bye-election. There can, however, be no foundation for the rumor as Judge Landry is revising officer for this county and is therefore not eligible to become a candidate.

It seems that President Harrison has not seen fit to accept the assurance of our government that the canal rebate system will be abolished on the close of the present session but has decided to put in force his retaliation measure at once.
