

LOCAL & GENERAL.

Pic-Nic.—The ladies of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church intend holding an afternoon picnic on Temperance Hall grounds, Kingston, Wednesday, Sept. 7th, beginning at 2 o'clock. Tea will be served from 3.30 until 6 o'clock, and a grand literary and musical entertainment will be given in the evening, commencing at 7.30 o'clock, when some of the best local talent will take part. Refreshments of all kinds will be found on the grounds and in the hall during the afternoon and evening. Proceeds go towards the church.

WHAT IS IT?—A curious phenomenon might be observed just now on any fine day. It consists of a life-sized portrait of a lady on the glass of the cupola window looking east in the Noble house. The specter, which is best seen when the sun is well to the south, is sweeping the harbor with an opera glass, and seems to have been much developed by the recent electric storms, which probably caused it in the first instance, someone's likeness having doubtless been stamped by some mysterious process on the window-pane while viewing the grandeur of a thunder storm. Any one knowing the original could easily recognize the portrait.

ECCTY COURT.—An application for an injunction in the suit of Edward Ryan and Denis Ryan against the Buctouche and Moncton Railway Company was argued at Chambers before Justice King in St. John last Thursday. When the company was building the road a part of plaintiff's land was taken by it under its statutory power for railway purposes. The damages or the same were assessed by a jury pursuant to the act but the company has failed to pay the amount assessed. This action was brought to restrain defendants from operating the road over the land until the damages are paid. J. D. Phinney, Q. C., and A. A. Stockton, Q. C., appeared on behalf of plaintiff, and W. W. Wells, Q. C., for defendant. His Honor reserved judgment.

LAWLESSNESS AT BUCTOUCHE.—Since the seizure of the cargo of smuggled liquor in Buctouche some time ago there has been much ill feeling displayed by certain parties who are supposed to have been interested in the liquor towards the Customs officials there and all concerned in the seizure. A few weeks ago a young man, who is said to have given the information which led to the seizure, was dragged from his wagon by two masked men as he was returning home one evening and given an unmerciful beating. The young man was unable to identify his assailants and therefore no proceedings were taken in the matter. The seized liquor was stored in the house of Mr. Jude J. LeBlanc, Collector of Customs. The Customs office is in the said building. Last Friday evening Mr. LeBlanc was asked by a man well known around the village, to step into an adjoining restaurant and join some friends in an oyster supper. He readily assented. While he was away a number of masked men broke into his house and carried off the liquor. Mrs. LeBlanc, who was alone in the house with several children was so badly frightened that she was unable to give the alarm until some time after they had escaped with their booty. On Saturday evening they returned, masked as before and proceeded to break in the Customs office door and smash the windows. An attempt was made by them to get possession of the seized schooner's register, but in this they were disappointed. Mr. David Keswick, Harbor Master, who also had a hand in the seizure, was found lying unconscious on the side of the street with his nose broken. It is pretty well known around Buctouche who the perpetrators of these outrages are, and it is pretty certain that some measures will be taken to bring them to justice. The offence against the revenue laws is a pretty serious one, and it is safe to say the Dominion government will not let the matter drop.

Mr. Robert Barry, of Kingston, Kitsap Co., Washington, arrived in Kent County last week after an absence in the United States of 39 years. Mr. Barry has resided in different parts of the neighboring republic, and his experiences since he left home would, if written, fill volumes. He notices a great change for the better in the condition of the farming population in this County, and says our farmers are now living in a state of comparative luxury—vastly different from some sections he has visited in the States. Mr. Barry, Dositheo Richard, inspector of weights and measures, who now resides in Richibucto, and Theophilus Blodreau, late of Cocagne, were the three first Acadian students in the Richibucto Grammar School. Mr. Barry says the oration he received from the inhabitants of St. Louis—his native place—and the kindnesses extended to him by the people generally was enough to melt his heart with joy, and will always be looked back to by him with pleasure. He is at present the guest of Mr. Dositheo Richard.

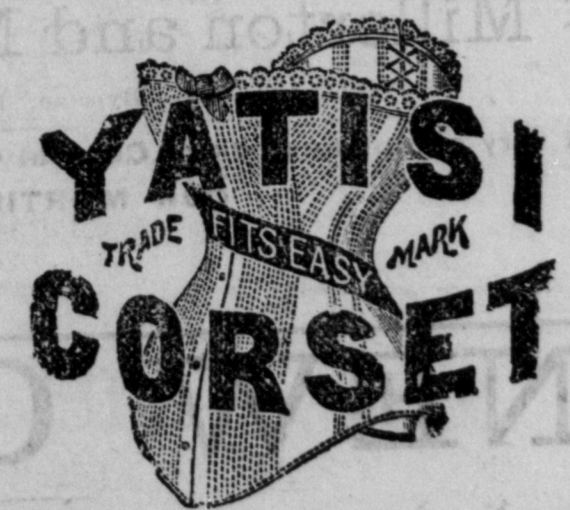
