A family in Reading, England, can prove by local records that they and their ancestors have paid rent for their house no less than 400 years.

An average of three British seamen lose their lives every day by drowning, and 300 British steamers and sailing vessels are lost at sea yearly.

Thirty years ago there was a great outcry against the lighting of St. Stephen's cathedral at Vienna by gas. The Archbishop has now introduced electricity.

A submarine electric lamp has been tested in Toulon at a depth of thirty feet. It illuminated a radius of 100 feet. Fish surrounded it like insects about a lamp.

At a recent New York reception the wedding cake of a bride's mother was served. It had been kept for that purpose, wrapped in brandied paper in a tin box.

Leaves attract dew; boards, sticks, and stones do not, because leaves have a chemical use for dew and detain it, while boards, sticks and stones have none and do not.

A visitor to Marshal McMahon says that the marshal is still a great sportsman. He starts out with his gun at six in the morning and walks twelve or fifteen miles a day. His hand is firm and his aim is sure.

When a healthy horse is enjoying perfect rest his pulse beat at the rate of forty times per minute, that of an ox fifty-two times, while sheep and hogs the average cardiac pulsations are seventy-six per minute.

The old-fashioned brimstone match, which was used with a tinder-box, was a little slip of very thin wood, six inches long and a quarter of an inch broad; it tapered at either end and was dipped in brimstone.

The common daphne grown in flower gardens is one of the most deadly poisons known to the botanist. Three or four of the berries will kill a man as quickly as strychnine and one has been known to kill a child in half an hour.

According to statistics compiled by the International Telegraph Bureau of Bern there was dispatched in Europe during the year 1891 207,595,000 telegrams; in the remaining portion of the world 88,422,000, a total of 296,017,000.

The Chinese empire and dependencies, Mongolia, Manchuria, Chinese Turkestan, Kokonor and Tibet occupy an area of at

least 5,000,000 square miles, or about one-third of Asia. The population is estimated at from 360,000,000 to 450,000,000.

The first patent in the United States was issued July 31, 1790, to Samuel Hopkins for making pot and pearl ashes. Four hundred and thirty-three thousand four hundred and thirty-six patents were issued during the first 100 years of the patent office.

Labouchere recently printed in truth the following as a record of the year's doings of the British clergy: Breach of promise, 14; cruelty to animals, 18; bankrupts, 254; elopements, 17; suicides, 12; drunkenness, 121; assaults, 109; various other charges, 84.

A successful trial was made on the Erie canal, at Lockport, N. Y., a few days ago of a full-sized canal boat equipped with revolving portable wheels running like overshot water wheels in air-tight recesses cut in from the bottom of the boat, a little forward of the stern.

In Spain, about 1630, the hoopskirts became so monstrous that an edict was issued commanding their reduction and ordering the confiscation of hoopskirts above the regulation size. The attempts to carry out the edict caused innumerable riots and were finally abandoned.

The French chamber of deputies has passed a bill prohibiting the employment of women in factories for one month before and after confinement, their usual wages to be continued by equal contributions from the state and the department in which the factory is situated.
