**A LONG VOYAGE.**—Barque "Unity," under command of Capt. Ritchie, arrived at Portland, Me., on the 20th from Liverpool, after a lengthy voyage of 76 days. The long voyage was the result of a series of calms and rough weather, and was not a most desirable trip to the captain and crew. The barque called at Londonderry, after leaving Liverpool and then put out for Portland. After leaving Londonderry the harmony of the voyage was interrupted by a row between a sailor and one of the mates which resulted in the mate being severely stabbed, in which an artery was severed. The captain at once put into Moville, where the injuries of the wounded man were treated. As a reward for their entertainment for the remainder of the crew, and as a means of preserving peace, the two pugilists were discharged at Moville. In addition to the fight on board the ship, after leaving Liverpool a severe storm was encountered by which the barque lost her sails and yards. Reinforcements were received at Moville and the "Unity" proceeded. She will load lumber for River Platte.—Globe.

**THE WOMEN'S COLUMN.**

In answer to Alie's request in REVIEW of Dec. 15th, I send my recipe for cranberry sauce. I use bog cranberries because I cannot get any other.

1 cup vinegar, 1 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon each cloves, cinnamon, allspice; boil, add 1 qt. cranberries, boil.

I have eaten it with the seeds taken out and without spice, but I like this almost as well and it is less trouble.

**CRANBERRY SAUCE.**—In answer to "Alie's" request I send the following recipe: Take high-bush cranberries and almost cover with boiling water, boil for 15 or 20 minutes, squeeze out the juice through coarse linen, (a wire sieve will turn it black and leave an unpleasant taste.) To one quart add one large cup sugar, boil from 15 to 30 minutes. For those who like the "sweet pickle" sauce, may add more sugar, vinegar and spices to taste. I usually make the bog cranberries in this manner when I cannot get the other kind.

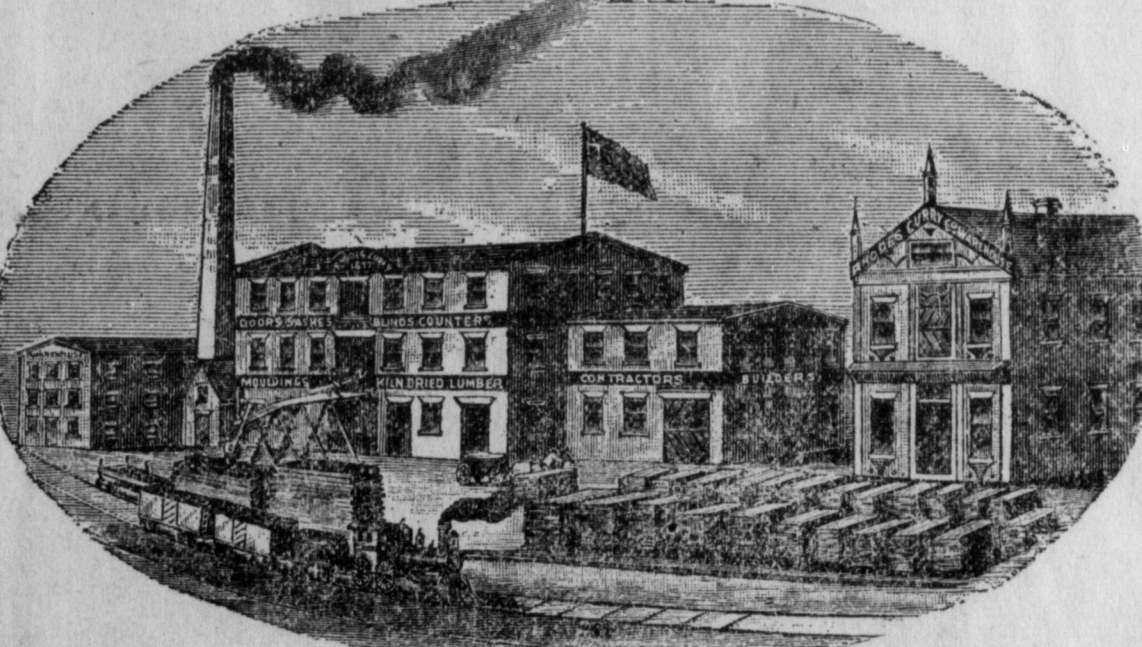
