Twelve thousand Canadian turkeys arrived in Liverpool on the 14th inst. in prime condition. They will be sold quickly as there is a great demand for the birds in England at this time of year.

Capt. Jas. Barker, of the Crown Land department had a narrow escape from drowning in the river opposite Chatham. While attempting to cross on the ice Capt. Barker broke through. He was in the water over twenty minutes before being rescued. During all this time he had great difficulty in keeping himself from being dragged under the ice by the current and only kept himself afloat by swimming to the upper side of the air hole, where he struggled until help arrived. He was then too weak to take hold of a pole

which was reached out to him but succeeded in tying a rope around his arm. In the effort to drag him out his arm was dislocated from its socket.

The government has reconsidered its decision to abolish the St. John immigration agency on January 1st, and has determined to continue it.

This appears in the Fredericton Reporter: "It will be remembered that about two years ago the province was excited over a melancholy shooting affray on the Tobique river, by which Mrs. Howe was shot and killed while floating down the river in a canoe with her husband, Major Howe both of whom came from their United States home to enjoy a season of fishing. Two men were arrested on the charge and are now in the penitentiary. On Saturday it was reported on the street that Major Howe, who subsequently married another woman, was arrested for causing her death and placed in prison. That he since died, and previous to his death confessed that he shot his wife in the canoe and that the men convicted were innocent."

City Councillor Rosselle of Kansas City brought suit in the Circuit Court to compel B. T. Whipple, a prominent capitalist, to pay \$250 as a penalty for not voting at the last spring election. Kansas City has a clause in its charter fixing a penalty of \$250 per capita on all who do not vote. The record of the voters' books show that 18,271 voters did not vote last year, and that consequently they owe the city \$4,567.50. This suit will be followed by others, to include every delinquent non-voter on the books.

Four of the Irishmen convicted in October, 1886, of having been accessory to the killing of Inspector Martin in Gweedmore, were liberated on the 24 inst. Martin was murdered by a mob while he was trying to arrest Father McFadden. The Healyites are hopeful that they will secure the speedy release of James Egan, the American dynamiter. Mr. Morley, the Irish secretary, is receiving many telegrams of congratulation and thanks in acknowledgement of these last developments of his humane policy.

The probate of Lord Tennyson's will has been granted. The gross personal estate amounts to £57,206. The entailed estates descend from Mr. Hallam Tennyson to the succeeding male heirs. The will was executed in 1884.
