

IN THE SUPREME COURT
IN EQUITY
BETWEEN ALBA C. STORER, plaintiff,
AND
GEORGE W. ROBERTSON, defendant.


Upon the application of Mr. Sayre,
for the plaintiff, and upon reading the
Bill in this cause and the affidavit of the
plaintiff of the truth of the matters there-
in contained and upon the plaintiff by his
counsel undertaking to abide by any
order this court may make as to damages
in case this court should hereafter be of
opinion that the defendant shall have
sustained any by reason of this order which
the plaintiff ought to pay, and also un-
dertaking to accept short notice of motion
to set aside this order and dissolve the
injunction hereby awarded, it is ordered
that Caleb Richardson, referee in equity
for the county of Kent, be appointed to
take possession of and receive all the stock
in trade, fishing gear, boats, fishing traps,
nets, anchors, floats and general fishing
gear and the fishing factories known as the
Crown fishing factory and Little
Gully factory, and all the supplies, nets,
gear, and other personal property con-
tained therein or connected therewith, the
packing shed at Richibucto near the rail-
way crossing occupied by the plaintiff and
defendant, and all its contents, the freezer
and fishing camps with all their contents
and all articles connected therewith owned
by the plaintiff and the defendant, the
schooner "Henry Swan" of the port of
Richibucto, and all documents of registry
or title, the machinery of the burnt tug-
boat Lula C., all the goods, chattels, per-
sonal property and effects, board debts,
money or choses in action which were
owned by the late firm of "Robertson &
Co." or the firm of Robertson & Storer,
and also all money or securities for money
now in the possession of or under the
control of the defendant being the prop-
erty or the proceeds of the property
owned by the firm of "Robertson &
Storer." And it is further ordered that
the defendant deliver over to the said
referee all such property and estate to-
gether with all books and papers relating
thereto upon demand. And it is further
ordered that the said defendant, his work-
men, laborer, servants and agents are
hereby strictly enjoined and commanded
under the penalty of four thousand dollars
to be levied on their lands, goods and
chattels, and also of imprisonment to
resist henceforth altogether absolutely
from selling, disposing of or destroying
or in any way interfering with the prop-
erty and estate above mentioned or with
the receiver and from selling, transferring,
disposing of or in any way interfering
with the title or evidences of title of the
schooner "Henry Swan" or the real estate
belonging to the firm of "Robertson &
Storer" known as the Crown factory and
lands connected thereto and twenty
acres of land at North Beach Richibucto,
the Little Gully factory, and the Mc-
Kinon camp and two other camps on the
Richibucto North Beach, and the packing
shed at Richibucto and thirty feet of land
on the easterly end thereof, until order
made to the contrary.
