THE WOMEN'S COLUMN.

"Now that election is over the next question of our is 'what shall I give my friends at Christmas?' and the handy girl rejoices in the fact that hand-made articles are just the thing, and always the most appreciated. Among the pretty and easily made gifts may be named, handkerchiefs with initials, glove and handkerchief cases; table scarfs; tidies; book marks and covers; brush and newspaper cases; blotter; pen stand; shaving book; neck kerchief with initial, etc., etc. All of which may be decorated with the needle or brush, and dainty bows of ribbon. Of the above mentioned I shall describe but two.

How to Make a Needle Banner.—Take a piece of Java canvas, (cloth or suiting) 2 1/2 x 14 inches. Cross stitch with embroidery, silk or crewels, one-half inch from each side and one and one-half inches from each end; fold in the centre, and sew together blindly under the stitching, fringe to that depth, and suspend by a cord of Saly ribbon from folded end. This makes an attractive and convenient receptacle for needles.

A Novel Match Safe.—Procure two clay smoking pipes, carefully gild them all over. In the ring which is under most hanging lamps insert these pipes in opposite directions and tie with a ribbon. The bowls of the pipes for matches, one for good ones the other for burnt. These pipes are pretty fastened to a pasteboard shield that has been covered with plush.

Pudding Sauce.—One cup each sugar and boiling water, butter half size of an egg, tablespoon of corn starch or flour, teaspoonful lemon extract.

About a Girl.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 8.—Near West-erville, twelve miles northeast of Columbus, there was a battle between the brothers of Lelia Bennet and her lover and his three brothers. Lelia's parents are dead. She is only 16 years old, and until two months ago lived with other minor children of the family with a married brother, who occupies the homestead farm. Between the Bennets and the Boggses, a neighboring family, an old feud existed, but it did not prevent Samuel Boggs falling in love with Lelia. Her brother positively forbade her seeing young Boggs and two months ago, with his brother Ed and a young man named Quince Vantassel, he went to the Bennet house when only Lelia and her sister were at home, kidnapping her, carried her away to the Boggs residence. Lelia made only a show of resistance, but her sister seized a gun and shot Vantassel, wounding him badly. Since then the Bennets have exhausted the law in attempting to secure possession of the young girl. She could not marry young Boggs for the reason that she was not of legal age and had no parent or guardian to give consent. Sunday her brothers—A. E. Bennet, H. N. Bennet, T. G. Bennet, and their brother-in-law, N. H. Hadley—drove to Boggs' house, the head of the family and his wife were at church, and took the Boggs boys by surprise. Lelia herself answered their knock and was seized by her brothers. The three Boggs boys attempted to rescue her and a terrific fight ensued. The Bennets say only fists were used, but the Boggses exhibit holes in their clothing which they say were made by bullets. The Boggs boys were soon lying senseless, according to all accounts, and the Bennets drove away with their sister. They have secreted her somewhere. It is thought they propose to put her in a convent. The feud is bitter and the families vindictive, and it is feared bloodshed will follow.

Married Eating Improves Health.

A habit easy to acquire and most difficult to overcome, is that of fast eating. The best food taken without thorough mastication is less digestible than that of an inferior quality well chewed. The mouth is a mill arranged to supply the digestive fluid in proportion to the amount of grinding done. When food is taken repeatedly without being ground sufficiently, the glands secreting this fluid lose their activity from want of use and dyspepsia ensues. Children should be trained to eat slowly, no matter how hungry or what important business is pressing. Much safer a little food well ground than a hearty meal swallowed in haste. Cold food is even more difficult to digest than hot if taken too rapidly. The normal temperature of the stomach is about 98 degrees, food has to be raised to this temperature before digestion can take place.

A large quantity of cold food thrown into the stomach by rapid eating is sure to be more or less injurious; the same food well masticated, would in the process, have considerable heat imparted to it; hence would be comparatively harmless. It is easy to see why icewater taken with the meals or in quantities alone so often proves hurtful. When a person is very tired chilled or overheated, the stomach, like the rest of the body, is not in good running order, even for well masticated food. At such times a cup of hot broth, milk, or water, with a dish of cream and sugar to flavor the latter would not tax the digestion, and would temporarily relieve the cravings of hunger, and so give time for nature's balance to be restored.

Those few suggestions are not for the invalid only, but for the well, with the hope that they may aid the former to regain and the latter to retain that prime blessing health.

Eminent Dancers.

Here is the proper place to observe that dancing has a bearing on the development of the social order. The medicine men, says the Popular Science Monthly, or priests gain and retain political and social powers through their skill in leading the dance. According to Mr. Beckwith, "the high priest in the religious ceremonies of the Dakotas is invariably a chief, who, through these dances, retains his influence in the tribe." Thus dancing gives sanction to the powers of the chief, and is one of the necessary qualifications for the office. It is thus associated with position and rank. In the Vedic age (2,000 B. C.), before the rigid division of the castes, the priests were leaders of the dance of the festivals. Later on they became all-powerful Brahmins. The Homeric chiefs were distinguished dancers. Lucian says that Troy was taken, Zeus was saved, and Ariadne ruined by a dance. And David led the dance before the ark. The ancients regarded dancing as a necessary accomplishment. Socrates learned the art in his old age, while Plato, in his Commonwealth, advocated the establishment of dancing schools. The Romans celebrated their victories and pastoral festivals by elaborate dances. They excelled in pantomime dances, from which the ballet was evolved. Emperor Domitian forbade the senators to dance, and for so doing removed several members of the senate. Grave statesmen and politicians of high degree have excelled in the oldest of arts. Both Sully and Cardinal Richelieu were expert dancers. Think of the august cardinal paying his court to Anne of Austria by performing a saraband before her in jester's dress of green velvet with bells on his feet and castanets in his hands!
