SAILORS SUE FOR WAGES.—The stipendiary on Saturday heard the evidence given in the action brought by a large number of sailors against the captain of the barque Bessie Markham for the recovery of wages alleged to be due. The sailors all testify that they desired to come ashore to see a magistrate and that the captain threatened them that if they went to a magistrate he would break their necks. One of the sailors stated that he was struck on the head with a piece of wood by the mate, and they all declare that they were deprived of water and orders were given to the cook to give them no meals. The captain Robert Stewart, denies the statement of the sailors. Jas. Young, one of the sailors, has an ugly wound on the back of the head, which, he states, was inflicted by the mate. The mate denies that he struck the sailor. The sailor's testimony however, is corroborated by six other sailors. The injured sailor came ashore and swore out a warrant against the mate for assault, but alleges that he was induced to abandon the charge by a threat that he would be arrested for desertion, he having left the ship without permission to lodge the complaint. The evidence in one case was concluded and His Honor announced that he would give judgment on Tuesday.—Halifax Echo.

A HERO.—Perhaps it is not generally known to our readers that Mr. John Le goof of this town, who returned home from the United States some months ago is a hero, but such is the fact, as he has on more than one occasion placed his own life in jeopardy to save that of others. He carries a handsome medal presented to him by the Humane Society of Massachusetts, which was organized in 1791. The arms of the society and the motto—"Refuge"—occupy one side, on the reverse the inscription reads:
