Dorchester. The trial of "Buck" was concluded Saturday night, the verdict being brought in as guilty, with recommendation to mercy. P. O. Carrol gave some important evidence, which he heard when all were supposed to be in bed, the first night after "Jim" was brought here, he being locked in a cell between the two prisoners. Among other things "Buck" says, "when I fired the shot I thought to escape, but ran right into two policemen. All I regret is that I didn't fix the big one too." (Meaning Scott) This alone gave the jury little trouble in bringing in the prisoner as guilty. The sentence has not yet been pronounced; probably both will be sentenced after the verdict has been given in "Jim's" trial, which began on Monday, he still refusing to give his name and is being known as "Jim."

Attorney General Blair, assisted by H. R. Emmerson, appear for the crown, while Mr. David Grant defended "Buck" and Mr. R. Barry Smith is defending "Jim." It is reported that the latter lately received the sum of three hundred dollars in gold from an unknown party, of rough appearance, to defend the prisoner.




