To the people of the Parish of Wellington: Mr. Legere's valuation for the Parish of Wellington is \$407,000. The Assessors' valuation is \$354,000. Through Mr. Legere's blunder the Parish is over valued \$53,000.

TO THE ELECTORS.

Before casting their ballots on Saturday the electors of the county should consider well the political situation and then vote as they think best for the interests of the province and their own county in particular. They should remember that the settled policy of the government is to unload upon the municipalities the burdens which have heretofore been borne by the province. Mr. Blair has already thrown upon the counties some severe burdens. If the electors will take the trouble to look over the Kent county accounts they will see that Mr. Blair's Registration of Births, Marriages and Deaths Act, costs this county over \$200 annually. They will also discover that the expenses thrown upon the county by the Health Act cost the county of Kent last year \$200. We do not ask the electors to accept our statements alone in this matter. The public accounts and proceedings of the county council have been printed and distributed broadcast throughout the county and everyone can satisfy himself as to the truth of our statements. But this is not all. Through the legislation of Mr. Blair and his party, the amount of our school warrants have decreased by about twenty per cent. Again we do not ask the electors to accept our unsubstantiated statement. They have only to compare our school warrants of to-day with those of two years ago and they can easily satisfy themselves on the subject. But Mr. Blair does not intend to stop there. His organ in St. John—inspired by him, no doubt—has announced that it is in favor of compelling the different municipalities of the province to maintain their roads and bridges. The electors will easily see that a county such as Kent, which has a very large number of bridges to keep up, could not possibly do so without provincial assistance. If this provincial assistance is withheld, as it seems certain it will be if Mr. Blair is returned to power, then it will be just as well for Kent county to go into bankruptcy at once. The county is too poor to have such a burden thrown upon it. For this reason we appeal to all the electors of this county, who have the good of the county at heart, to vote against the Blair administration, vote against increased taxation, vote for the best interests of the county, vote for Phinney and Gogain.

See that your ballots read Phinney and Gogain.
The Monitor Acadian says: "The campaign is pursued with great activity in Kent county, and our friends are gaining ground every day. Acadians, Irish and English are united this time in their efforts to teach Mr. Blair a lesson for his broken promises and his refusal to do justice to the county in the matter of the representation. Mr. Phinney, as our readers, know is an able, honest and capable man, and a man of broad and generous views. Mr. Gogain is recognized as an active and energetic man, possessing the stuff to make a creditable representative of the people. He is fluent, expresses himself with facility, and possesses an excellent judgement. The ticket, Gogain-Phinney, is the ticket of the day, popular alike in the north and in the south."
The electors should remember that the announced policy of the Blair government is municipal taxation for the construction and repair of roads and bridges. Every vote cast for Legere and Barnes in this contest is a vote cast in favor of that policy.

The Monitor Acadian reminds the Acadians of Kent that Mr. Blair and Mr. Legere have broken faith with the people of this county. It says: "THE REVIEW announces that Mr. McInerney will not lend his aid to Messrs Legere and Barnes, but will endeavor to elect Phinney and Gogain, the opposition candidates. His reason for doing so is the breach of faith by the government in regard to the county of Kent. Mr. Blair said at the elections of 1891: 'If you wish three members, elect Legere. If you elect Gogain, you say that you do not want three representatives.' Mr. Legere was

elected, but Mr. Blair forced him to vote against the resolution giving a third member to the counties of Kent, Gloucester and Carleton. Mr. McInerney is deeply chagrined over Mr. Blair's breach of faith, and will not overlook the insult."

By voting for Legere and Barnes the electors of Kent will be voting to tax themselves for the maintenance and repair of their roads and bridges. Write your ballots for Phinney and Gogain.

A resident of Harcourt who was in Richibucto yesterday states that Mr. Phinney had a large and enthusiastic meeting in Harcourt Tuesday evening. At the close of Mr. Phinney's remarks, the bumptious Hutchinson arose and attempted to repeat his little essay. The electors, however, left the building in a body, and the meeting broke up without giving him a chance to tell the people of Harcourt what Mr. Blair had told him to say to the people of Kent.

The electors of Kent should take a strong stand against direct taxation and municipal taxation to maintain roads and bridges by voting solidly for Phinney and Gogain.

A letter from Charlotte County to a gentleman in Richibucto says that the opposition feel confident of carrying at least two seats in that county. At the last general election, Charlotte returned four government supporters by acclamation. From all over the province come cheering reports of the prospects of the opposition. It looks as if the Blair government is doomed.

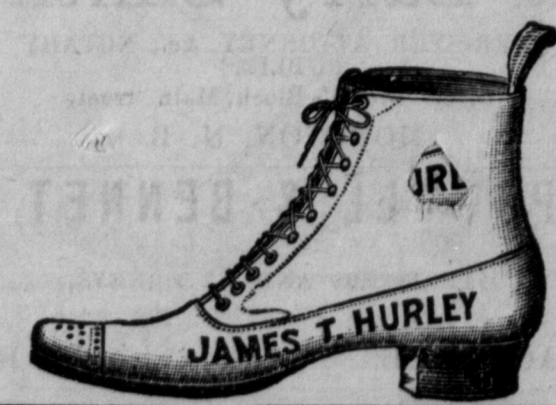
