SUPREME COURT.—Before the Supreme Court at Fredericton, Tuesday, the demurrer in the cause LeBlanc vs. Wheten, sheriff of Kent, was argued. Geo. W. Allen supported demurrer, Geo. F. Gregory contra. Court considers.

STABBING AT SEA.—At Merville, Ireland, on Sept. 30, Patrick Breen, an able-bodied seaman belonging to the Chatham barque "Unity," was charged with seriously assaulting the second mate, Walter Davis, by stabbing him in the thigh on Sept. 16 while at sea. Davis ordered Breen to do some work, but he disobeyed the order. Davis then asked him why he was so young about it. Some hot words passed between the men, whereupon Davis struck Breen a couple of times with a belaying pin. Breen then stabbed Davis with a knife, and the latter had to be carried off. Davis admitted that he had lost his temper, and that he struck Breen and knocked him down. He was sorry for the whole matter, and asked that Breen be leniently dealt with. As Breen had been severely dealt with by Davis, and the fact that he had been eight days in jail, the magistrate was of the opinion he suffered enough and ordered his discharge. GENTLEMEN:—The Legislature of this province has, for reasons which has not yet been made public, been dissolved by the Government two years before the expiry of the term for which the assembly was elected, and it is announced that a general election of members to represent the electorate at Fredericton will be called on immediately.

Nomination is fixed for Saturday the 15th, and polling for Saturday the 22nd October.

Rumors of an intended dissolution have been current for some weeks, and I have as opportunity offered, consulted with many of you, and in consequence of the solicitations and encouragement I have received, have decided to again be a candidate for the representation of the county which has on two former occasions honored me with its confidence and support.

You are familiar with my position, my votes and my views expressed in the Legislature and reported in the public press, since I have been a member of the House of Assembly. Whether these have in all instances met with your approval or not, I cannot say, but while I hope this is the case—one thing I can fairly claim, and that is that I have endeavored faithfully to discharge the responsible trust reposed in me, and to do no discredit to my native county, whose people I was privileged to represent.

My conduct in the past will, I trust, afford some guarantee of my course in the future, should you again repose your confidence in me.

While I have had, and still retain pronounced opinions on public questions, I have on all occasions sought, and if re-elected, will again seek to promote such legislation as will, in my judgement, best secure the interest of the province in general and my own county in particular.

The time prior to the election is unusually brief, but I propose calling public meetings and addressing as many of you as I can meet, upon the questions which have arisen during the past two years, and may be expected to arise in the near future, in connection with our provincial politics.

I will also see as many of you personally, as I can, but it will be impossible for me to meet you all. I would ask all who may now be favorable to my election, to do what they fairly can to advance my candidature—with the assurance that I will, if elected, endeavor fairly to represent the mixed electorate of this fine county, irrespective of creed or nationality.

There were delegates from every parish, numbering thirty-eight in all, nine of whom were English. E. B. Bunkerfield was chosen chairman and Peter H. Leger secretary. An attempt was made by some of the French, backed by the whole of the English to have an English candidate for the balance of the term of this parliament. Those in favor of this on counting noses found they had only sixteen votes. They waited on C. C. Carlyle but as the majority was strongly in favor of claiming the seat for an Acadian, no attempt was made to bring it to a vote. Mr. Basil Johnson of St. Louis received the nomination by a unanimous vote. He is a clever young man and deservedly popular where known.
