TOBACCO FOR CONSUMPTIVES.

The habitual use of tobacco has been so often denounced by medical men and those who claim to have given study to the subject that one is scarcely prepared to find the use of the weed recommended by a leading medical journal as a preventive of certain diseases most dangerous to human life. The Pacific Medical Journal, however, in an article published in its July number strongly urges the use of tobacco among those affected with pulmonary complaints and recommends it as a valuable agent in destroying the germ that produces consumption. It points out as a demonstrated fact that the plant is destructive to many kinds of germs and proceeds to give the results of a number of experiments with tobacco smoke in which the development of the bacilli of various diseases was retarded or prevented. Regarding his own experience with pulmonary diseases the writer has the following to say:

For twenty years I have been engaged in the general practice of medicine, and during that time have treated many cases of pulmonary tuberculosis. I do not remember that one of my consumptive cases was a habitual smoker of tobacco. My reflections on this subject lead me to suggest that tobacco smoke, as inhaled daily and almost hourly by the habitual smoker, retards or prevents the development of the bacillus tuberculosis in the larynx and lungs of the smoker, as it has been demonstrated to prevent the development of the bacilli of typhus fever and pneumonia. Look back upon your cases of consumption and recall to mind any among them who were habitual smokers of tobacco. As far as I can recall to mind, tobacco-smokers have good lungs.

Among dentists, he says, the fact is recognized that tobacco is an active destroyer of germs, and that tobacco users have the best preserved teeth. As a further argument in favor of his contention he points out that among females, who are generally non-smokers, consumption is much more prevalent than among men. In conclusion he strongly recommends the attention of all physicians to the subject, saying:—

I am so strongly impressed with the probability of tobacco smoke being in some degree a cure or preventive of tuberculosis, that I desire to call the attention of the physicians to the subject. It is not possible that tobacco smoke does prevent the development of the bacillus tuberculosis in the lungs of the smoker? If it is capable of destroying the germ that causes caries of the teeth, why should it not be equally effective against the germ that causes caries of the lungs? How many habitual smokers die of consumption? I do not hesitate to advise moderate smoking to those who develop a tendency to pulmonary tuberculosis.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN THIS COUNTY.

The death of Dr. Legere has left this constituency without a representative in the Dominion parliament, and there is much speculation as to who will be chosen to fill the vacancy. There is said to be an unusually large crop of aspirants and there will no doubt be some lively times before the matter is finally settled. Mr. U. Johnson, ex M. P. P. has been the first to place himself at the disposal of the electorate of the county. No one appears to have had curiosity enough to ask Mr. Johnson which party he is prepared to support, and as no one except himself regards his candidature as serious the question is of little interest. Dr. Bourque of this town has also a very large political bee in his bonnet, and would not be unwilling to take upon himself the onerous duties of an M. P. It is said he has been doing some quiet canvassing during the past week, and thinks his chances good. Hon. O. J. LeBlanc who was so badly beaten by Dr. Legere at the last general election has expressed his willingness to again lead the Liberal party and will no doubt be called upon to do so. Just now the conservative choice would appear to be between Mr. John B. Goguen, of Cocagne, and Councillor Basile J. Johnson, of St. Louis, with the chances in favor of the former. Both these young men have been straightforward supporters of the party, and either of them would make a creditable representative. It is, however, too early in the day to say with any degree of certainty who will be chosen as the government standard-bearer. There are other men mentioned as possible candidates, all Acadians with the exception of Mr. Geo. V. McInerney of this town. The practice in this county has heretofore been to call an Acadian convention, irrespective of party and the one who succeeded in capturing the nomination in that body

received the almost united support of the French electors. Party lines have of late, however, been much more sharply defined and it would now seem impossible to unite the French electors in support of any candidate. In the past the great majority of the Acadians of Kent have supported the Conservative party. At the last Dominion election, however, great numbers of them followed Mr. LeBlanc into the Liberal camp and there appears a strong determination among them to remain there. Only a short time ago the Moniteur Acadien made the boast that the Acadians of this province were almost a unit in their support of the present government. If the Moniteur takes the trouble to look over the returns of the last Dominion election it will be compelled to make an exception of this county. As a fact it was an almost solid English vote that secured Dr. Legere his election by so large a majority. Mr. LeBlanc the Liberal candidate in that election obtained a majority of the votes in Wellington and St. Mary, two of the largest French parishes in the county. The Liberal managers here claim that a change has been steadily going on ever since, and that a majority of the Acadians of this county are to-day in sympathy with the opposition. Those who profess to see serious difficulties threatening the government here on account of its action in refusing to promote Judge Landry to the Supreme Court have been altogether misinformed as to the true state of affairs in the county. Judge Landry's elevation would no doubt have been received with great satisfaction by his compatriots in Kent but it is safe to say the action of the government in the matter will not lose them a single vote in the coming election. The Acadians here are joining the Liberal party because they see at the head of that party a gentleman of their own nationality and because a number of their clergymen are of that political faith. A large majority of the English speaking voters of the county are on the other hand Conservative and a vigorous contest may be expected. It is all very well for government supporters outside the county to predict an easy Conservative victory but it is useless to attempt to deny the fact that the Liberal party in Kent is stronger than it ever was. Conservatives here are aware that they have a heavy fight on their hands and are not over confident of success.

The vote on the want of confidence resolution in the British Parliament last week stood 350 to 310. The House consists of 370 members. As the speaker and two whips on each side did not join in the vote, and two constituencies remain unrepresented, there could have been only three absentees. This is the largest vote ever recorded in the British House of Commons. The following is given as a list of Mr. Gladstone's cabinet:— W. E. Gladstone, First Lord of the Treasury. Henry H. Fowler, President of the Local Government Board. H. Campbell Bannerman, Secretary of War. Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty. John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland. A. J. Mundella, President of the Board of Trade. Sir Charles Russell, Attorney General. John Rigby, Solicitor General. Samuel Walker, Lord Chancellor of Ireland. Mr. McDermott, Attorney General for Ireland. Edward P. C. Majoribanks, Patronage Secretary. Alexander Asher, Solicitor General for Scotland. J. B. Balfour, Lord Advocate. Messrs. Bryce and Acland will also have seats in the cabinet, while the Marquis of Ripon, Earl Kimberly and Sir George O. Trevelyan will undoubtedly be members of the government. The Earl of Aberdeen is mentioned to succeed Lord Stanley as Governor-General of Canada.

Notes from the Restigouche. CAMPBELLTON, Aug. 11.—As many of your readers have a knowledge of the Restigouche, a synopsis of the season's doings amongst the salmon may not come amiss. Angling opened about the 28th of May and held good all June. Lumber drives somewhat spoiled the novice, or those guides who were not equal to the task of following the fish through hundreds of floating logs, and was the means of causing a few odd "cusses," when the fish would get clear within a yard of the leader. But to the angler who was not fishing for a "bag" but for the sport and excitement attending it, there can be nothing equal to a fight with a 30lb fish on single gut amongst hundreds of floating logs, and one fish killed under such difficulties is worth a dozen killed in the clear river. The best angling I have heard of is 70 fish for two rods, 40, 50, and 60 for parties of three, single rods from 10 to 30 fish, according to locality. Mr. Mitchell, of Connecticut, his first season here, but who has made his mark at Uncle Sam's preserve at the Bangor dam, landed 31 fish in fourteen days. The average weight runs

from 21 to 24 lbs. The heaviest fish taken on Mr. Stancliff's water at Flat Lands by Conductor Rutherford, was 45 lbs.; 30, 32, and 35 lbs, were not at all infrequent, and on the whole, the season has been fair and the devotees of the rod have gone home satisfied and wishing for another year. Netters, particularly on the coast have done fairly well, and the total for the four counties will reach 1,000,000 lbs. Price less than formerly, at one time 8 cents. This no doubt is owing to the large quantity of spring salmon from Vancouver and New Westminster as well as Columbia river, as I saw lots of them in New York in May, selling at 13 cents—fine looking fish, and in good condition. I hear the Nepisiguit has panned out well for some rods and nothing for others, the Caspédia has not turned out equal to expectations, and only some few of the Labrador rivers have given good bags. I see it noted Mr. Blanchard, the originator of that great angler's petition, only killed one fish. I see orders in Council further protecting trout. This may be right in trout rivers, but a decided mistake in a salmon stream. M.
