She left Scotland about 60 years ago and settled with her husband at Bass River and with him endured many of the hardships incident to pioneer life in the wilds of N. B. She had also her own share of the sorrows of life; her husband and a number of her children having preceded her to the grave. But she bravely bore up under all, having strong trust in God. She was characterized by sturdy common sense and a genuine, though unaffected piety. Kind and hospitable at home, she was a "succorer of many" abroad. The large numbers present at her funeral on Saturday indicated how warmly she was esteemed in the neighborhood in which she lived.



The vessels ashore at Tabusintac are the Norwegian barque Europa, Captain Grunde, and the Italian barque Zio Battista. The Margaretta F. and Atlantic are ashore at Escuminac. All will be total wrecks. The crews are safe.

The Buctouche picnic will be on the 23rd and 24th of this month and not on the 22nd and 23rd as some papers have it. In case of bad weather it will take place on the following days. Great crowds are expected at that last festival of the season and they will have every opportunity to enjoy themselves.

In connection with the district meeting of the Miramichi district of the Methodist church, which meets at Harcourt on the 23rd inst., there will be a Sabbath school convention, commencing at three o'clock. The various clergymen of the district will give addresses, etc., with Bible lesson at evening service.

The hay crop in Restigouche on account of the dry weather in the first of the season is below an average. What is not already secured will be much damaged by the heavy rains. The rivers are swollen higher than they were during the spring freshet. It is thought that some of the bridges may be swept away.

The schooner St. Martins Packet, owned by Gilbert Renaud and others, is in charge of Custom officers at Buctouche, and will be held pending investigation of a charge of smuggling. Several small lots of liquors, supposed to have been smuggled from St. Pierre, Mig., have been located by Tidewater Keswick within the past week.
