PRESENTATION OF A BELL.—The large bell for St. Martin's Church in the Wood, Quebec, arrived on Friday and was in its place on Sunday. It came from Baltimore and is pronounced by all who have seen it to be a very fine one. Its weight is 1800 pounds. It is given by the children of the late Hon. Daniel Hanington and is said to be heard ten miles away. On the side of the bell in large letters are these words: "Erected by their children in memory of Hon. Daniel Hanington and Mrs. Hanington 1892." The old bell has been donated to St. Alban's church Cocagne.

FREDERICKTON DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTION.—Mr. Geo. E. Powers, one of the assistants, is in town soliciting subscriptions in aid of the above institution. Out of twenty-nine pupils, representing different counties of the province, the following six are from Kent County: Merriam Bleakney, Willie Bleakney, Laura Bleakney, from Kent Junction, Annie Marsh and Minnie Marsh, from Bass River, and Carrie Whelan, from Moulies River. A beautiful and commodious building was opened last year, and accommodation is provided for nearly double this number. The names and addresses of uneducated deaf-mute children will be gladly received by the principal, Mr. A. F. Woodbridge, with a view to their early admission.

FUNERAL OF EDWIN W. BROWN.—A special train was run to Kent Junction last Friday night to meet the I. C. R. express to bring in the body of Edwin W. Brown, who was killed in Chicago by falling from an elevated railway. It appears that the young man stepped from his engine to the platform to look after something requiring his attention. He went a little too far forward, and fell to the stone pavement below, a distance of 26 feet, breaking his arm and sustaining severe internal injury. He lived for four days after the accident. The body was accompanied by two members of the Locomotive Brotherhood from Chicago. Several members of the order from Moncton were also in attendance. The funeral took place Sunday at two o'clock. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. Wm. Hamilton. At the grave the burial service of the Order of Locomotive Brotherhood was read by William Leonard, of Chicago. Deceased had many warm friends in Richibucto, and his sad end has caused universal regret.

HYMNICAL.—A very interesting event took place in Dalhousie on the 9th inst., which caused no little commotion. Dr. Crockett, Frederick, and Miss Helen, daughter of the late Hon. W. The canoe came ashore near Florant's point, Quebec side of the bay, with bottom up. It is now confidently believed that the men have been drowned. One of them leaves a wife and two children. The other two were single.

—Mr. John Hogan, Upper Charles, raised a large crop of ensilage corn last season. When it was growing it had a magnificent appearance. When at its full growth it was upwards of 12 feet in height. Mr. Hogan has the credit of being the first in the county to raise this excellent plant for food for cattle. His example will be followed by many progressive farmers. From 20 to 30 tons can be raised from 2 acres of good soil.

—The Rev. D. McIntyre, of North Carolina, recently sent a fine specimen of the cotton plant, richly laden with pods, to a friend in Restigouche. Many of the pods are opened, and ready for the picker; others have not reached maturity. The plant is put in a suitable box, and is utilized in giving object lessons in the schools. Mr. McIntyre, who is a native of Dalhousie, has the thanks of the pupils and others. Industrious Teachers will always be ready to avail themselves of such objects to illustrate the different subjects to their pupils.
