One of the many advantages of education is displayed in the case of a negro woman who not long ago married a man of unprepossessing appearance, and anything but an amiable disposition.

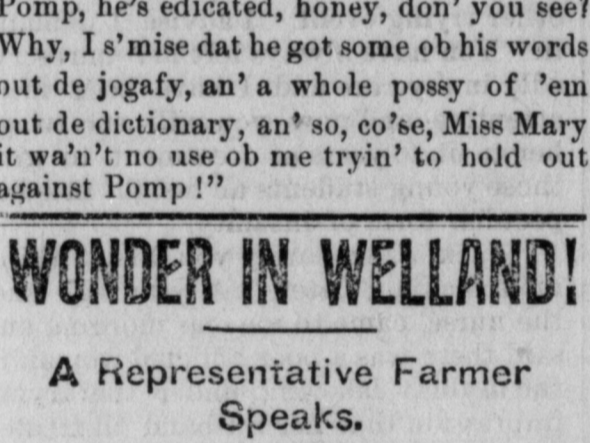
She had formerly been a servant, and one of the young ladies of the family with whom she had lived asked her how she ever came to marry Pompey.
