To the Editor of The Review:—

We have had a glorious fight and have won a glorious victory. We fought shoulder to shoulder and brought our men out almost together. It reminds me of the old rhyme in England:

"The men of Kent to battle went,
They feared no wild confusion,
But joined with York they did the work,
And made a blest conclusion."

And now we will be called upon to elect a man to represent us in the House of Commons.

What kind of a man do we wish him to be, for the general good of this our county of Kent? In the first place we want him to be a staunch supporter of the National Policy. It will be better too, to have a man whose interest is in Richibucto or Kingston, or near thereto, and who will do his best to get straight communication between Richibucto and Liverpool. If only one steamer could be subsidized to go between these ports, the county of Kent would soon put on a new face, and our farms, instead of being deserted, as they are now, would then be taken up by farmers from the old country.

Our young men and old men too, would stay at home and cultivate their farms and raise double the produce they do now if they had a market for it.

England is holding out every inducement to us to send there our surplus produce.

The policy of our government is to furnish the great North West with farmers. It behooves us to do what we can to bring emigrants through Kent, that we may have a chance to stop them on the way. There are plenty of farmers in England that pay in rent every year what would buy them as good a farm here, and every other advantage they have in the old country: that is to say—a good neighborhood, schools, churches, stores, etc.

At a future day I will give a few more of my thoughts for the improvement of my adopted country.

A KENT MAN IN TROUBLE.—A Boston despatch says:—Special Agent Converse J. Smith, of the United States Treasury Department, on Friday seized at the Eastern Railway depot a consignment of eggs shipped by R. J. Melanson, general merchant, of St. Marys, Kent county, N. B. This consignment consisted of six barrels and two cases of eggs, or a total of 476 dozens, which were entered in the regular way at the sub-port of Vanceboro, Maine. Special Agent Smith, who has been investigating the fraudulent entry of eggs from the provinces, discovered in this case that there was other merchandise besides eggs in the barrels and boxes. Each barrel contained men's socks. In all there were 300 pairs such as are made in large quantities in the provinces. The socks were not entered with the eggs and therefore all the goods will be forfeited to the United States. The law permits the immediate sale of perishable merchandise and undoubtedly the eggs will be sold at public auction on next Monday or Tuesday. Several seizures of eggs have been made at Eastport this week, the result of fraudulent entries.

In all imitations of the Myrtle Navy tobacco yet attempted, either inferior stock has been used or the plug has been made a trifle lighter in weight. The latter defect is apt to escape the attention of the consumer until he finds that he is smoking a greater number of plugs than before. The Myrtle Navy is made three plugs to the pound and each plug is carefully weighed.

MARRIAGE IN HIGH LIFE.—One of the most fashionable weddings of the season took place on the 3rd inst., at the "Kirk," Bathurst Village, N. B., when John Peters, Esq., of Canobie, Gloucester Co., N. B., was united in matrimony to Mrs. Ann Smith, widow of the late William Smith, Esq., of Condon England. The wedding was very quiet, owing to the recent death of a near relative of the groom. There were no bridesmaids, but the charming bride looked lovely in a travelling dress of grey cloth with bonnet to match. After the ceremony was performed the happy couple left by the fast express for Canobie, where they will reside in future, and on arriving there they met with a hearty reception from their friends. We join in wishing them a long and happy life. Fox.

"Head work?"







To the Electors of the County of Kent:

GENTLEMEN:—At a meeting composed of delegates from school districts of the county—of all creeds and nationalities—held at Buctouche on the 14th of this month, I had the honor to be the chosen candidate to fill the seat vacant by the lamented death of Dr. Legere.

In accepting this choice and this honor, I make no illusions to myself on the obligations which result by it and on the duty imposed upon me.

So I come to-day to ask the support of electors friendly to the cause for which I am to-day in the field.

It is useless for me, gentlemen, to tell you that if elected—as I hope to be—it shall be my endeavor to advance the interests of the County of Kent, irrespective of creed and nationality.

In politics I am and have been a Liberal-Conservative.

I will favor the expansion of commerce and exchange with the United States, in as much as our neighbors will give us the return of what they will receive from us.

I am in favor of a free trade with the United States in regard to the products of the land, the sea and the forest, in accordance with the programme of the political party now in power at Ottawa; that is to say—the abolition on each side of all duty on the articles of exportation produced by the farmer, the fisherman, and the lumberman.

I also pledge myself to favor, in a particular manner, the project of having a ferry between Prince Edward Island and Richibucto Cape, corresponding by rail with the Buctouche & Moncton Railway, south, and with the Kent Northern, north. This project—I think—can be realized in the probable case when the tunnel between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine should be—for cause of excessive expense—finally abandoned.

Before polling day I will have the advantage to visit every parish of the county, and make with the electors a better acquaintance.


