MOWATT. The September number of the Lake Magazine contains an article from thepenof Attorney General Longley of Nova Scotia, dealing with the future of Canada. Mr. Longley declares that his object in publishing the article is not to support or condemn the views of any person or party as to the destiny of the country, but simply to endeavor to clear the ground for a free and rational discussion of the subject. He feels satisfied that Canada cannot always remain a colony, and that Canadians will sooner or later be brought face to face with the problem, and he thinks that now is the proper time to begin the discussion. Commenting on the dismissal of Crown Attorney Myers, he strongly condemns the action of Sir Oliver Mowatt in the matter Roseberry, he says, was induced to accept and declares that such a course will tend to stifle a free discussion of the future of request. He attributes her majesty's this country. He contends that the fact of Mr. Myers being a sworn official of the government has nothing to do with the case, and quotes from speeches of John Bright, who, notwithstanding his oath as a minister of the crown, expressed his desire to see one confederation, one people, one language and one law throughout the length and breadth of the American continent. "Is there any Canadian." he asks, "so spiritless as to deny to himself the same right to speak of the destiny of his own country, which is enjoyed with out question by a member of the English Commons." Why then, he inquires, should so eminent a man as Professor Goldwin Smith, whose devotion to the empire is unquestioned, be abused because he has ventured to advocate a union of the English-speaking people on this continent, and why should it be charged against Mr. John V. Ellis that he violated his oath as a member of the Canadian Commons when he presented a similar proposal. Mr. Longley declares that, apart from our present position, there are three courses open to us, namely, a direct union with the mother country, a political union with the United States, or independence. The first of these, imperial federation, he regards as a scheme which appeals more to sentiment than to "the innate common sense" of the people, but admits that it is preferable to our present condition. He then proceeds to enumerate the arguments that could be advanced by advocates of political union with the United States. While he admits that the arguments in its favor are many, he wishes it to be distinctly understood that he is not an advocate of the scheme. On the contrary, he declares that if he were compelled to make a choice to-day he would vote against political union. Regarding independence he thinks "the sentiment lies in that direction." In conclusion, he again declares that his purpose is not to advocate any of these three alternatives, but simply to call public attention to the matter, and to urge upon the people of Canada the necessity of discussing the subject freely, fairly, fully and honestly. He is confident that such a discussion will reveal the advantages and disadvantages that would result from an adoption of either of these alternatives, and will result in a wise and judicious decision on the question.

A DISSOLUTION.

The rumor that has been gaining ground for some time past that the local legislature will be dissolved, and an appeal made to the country before another session is now regarded as almost a certainty. The announcement that a dissolution was imminent was first made in the opposition press, and the government organs have not. ventured to deny it. Indeed, some of them have sone so far as to affirm it. Several reasons have been given why Mr. Blair desires a dissolution before the expiration of the term. One is that as there are two and perhaps three vacancies to fill in any case, now would be the most convenient time to hold the elections. Another is that he fears the opposition will be prepared next session to submit to a committee of the House the charges formulated by them last winter, and he dreads the effect of the disclosures that would result on the eve of a general election. MR. LABOUCHERE AND THE

QUEEN. Mr. Labouchere has published in Truth the correspondence between Mr. Gladstone and himself in reference to his exclusion from the new cabinet. Despite Mr. Gladstone's explanations, Mr. Labouchere still persists in his assertion that the queen interfered in the matter, and refused to accept him as one of her advisers. He makes the further assertion that this was not the only case in which the queen took a hand in the formation of the cabinet. Lord the office of foreign secretary at her special action in his case to his hostile attitude toward royal grants. It has been pointed out that this could not have been the true reason. Mr. Samuel Storey was offered and refused an important position in the ministry though he has been much more determined and bitter in his opposition to royal grants than has Mr. Labouchere. Sir Charles Dilke, who was a member of Mr. Gladstone's last cabinet, was a persistent opponent of these grants, yet it has never been hinted that her majesty in any way attempted to interfere in the matter of his appointment. That the queen did interfere, however, in the case of Mr. Labouchere is pretty generally believed. Mr. Labouchere is a Radical of the most advanced type. He is also a clever writer and a brilliant and sarcastic speaker. One of his favorite pastimes has been to hold the nobility and aristocracy of England up to ridicule from a public platform or tbrough the columns of his paper. He has thus brought upon himself the enmity of the queen, and to this, no doubt, he owes his exclusion from the cabinet. He is in receipt, however, of a salary of \$50,000 a year from his paper and can afford to treat the matter lightly. In the meantime he has had his revenge by dragging the queen's name into the controversey, and thus shocking old time Tories who look upon his action in this matter as not far removed from treason.

The action of the local government in dissmissing Mr. David W. Brown from his position as inspector of the Woodstock bridge is not calculated to improve the government's chances in Kent, where Mr. Brown is well known and has many friends. The reason given for his dismissal is one that will not be accepted by the people of this vicinity. He has the reputation of being a painstaking and competent engineer, and one who would be incapable of resorting to the conduct charged against him. It is probable that the fault lay in the selection of the site of the bridge and not in any misconduct on the part of the inspector.

It is announced that the Earl of Aberdeen will succeed Lord Stanley as Governor-General of the Dominion at the expiration of the official term in May next.

The census bulletin dealing with the nationalities of the people of Canada makes some strange disclosures. The government for a number of years has been freely spending money to promote emigration and assist immigrants. During the last ten years it has spent nearly \$4,000,000 and brought into this country nearly nine hundred thousand immigrants from Europe. Yet the census figures show that there are only about 19,000 more Europeans in Canada now than there were in'81. In France an immigration agency has been maintained and thousands upon thousands of Canadian dollars have been spent there, yet the increase of the number of citizens from that countryis less than one thousand. If the statistics of the government are correct, this country has given assistance to nearly a million of people to get to the United States.


