NONE OTHER GENUINE

To the Editor of The Review:

I read somewhere that, "the Acadicians of Kent are joining the Liberal party because a number of their clergymen are now of that political faith." Who could believe this? Impossible!

As a general rule our clergymen take little or no interest in political struggles. These gentlemen, however, know a great deal about men and things. Being a well educated body, they are naturally well posted, not only in spiritual works but also in material enterprises.

Silent witnesses of what is going on in the world, they could certainly pass a very sound judgment on the ups and downs of our Dominion, but they respect too much public opinion and they are too much of a patriotic mind and loyal subjects to step on a platform which seems to have very weak foundations such as to-day the Liberal platform.

Therefore, I say without fear of being contradicted that our French clergymen, independent men as they are, can refuse to admit that the Conservative party, has not always been ready and anxious to do justice to all denominations alike and to their country.

Indeed our friends have always been looking to the future greatness of our Dominion of Canada. They did not limit their policy to the welfare of one particular portion of Canada; not to the large cities only, but to the humblest hamlet, and in fact, to the whole Dominion.

And then let us be honest. Which party has done the most for Kent? When the Liberals were in power, what did they do for the country at large, and for Kent in particular? Did they subsidize one mile of railway in Kent? Did they build or repair one inch of public wharf? Did they try to provide our people with convenient mail services? No!

As a general rule, Liberals are very friendly to the people when in opposition but very selfish and self-care-taking when in power.

And coming to facts; who helped the St. Louis branch railway? The Kent Northern, and the Buctouche & Moncton railways? Who built our public wharves? Who gave Kent its numerous postoffices? Who is going to help our new branch of railway to Richibucto Cape, to repair our public buildings and put up new ones in spite of Mr. R. Johnson? Sir J. A. McDonald's began the good works and Sir J. Abbott's is sure to finish them. How then could our good clergymen close their intelligent eyes to these facts and help in breaking faith with our Dominion government? Oh! no, never! Because with a well educated French man, *honneur oblige*.

It appears, that a number of our Kent Liberals would gladly support the Conservative party if they could only get a market for potatoes and eggs. They say that Sir Abbott does not go fast enough in the business. Yes it is true our friends go slowly and surely, but, at the same time, they are not to be found at a standstill when our national interests are at stake. They wish to trade on fair basis, and unlike the Liberals, they do not care to see the Americans coming in to take charge of our business, make the price of our products and so help our local jobbers to ruin our poor farmers.

I think that we have not this day in Kent one single aspirant who would attempt to run the next federal election in opposition to the present administration.

A Liberal cannot run; because it has been said hundreds of times that it would be folly to send a man to oppose a strong government. We could get nothing. An Independent cannot run; because we have been told right and left that there is no place in our houses of Assembly for such a man. Therefore common sense teaches us that the vacant place in Ottawa remains for a thorough Conservative, and for at least three years to come no Liberal nor Independent need apply.


