VESSELS ASHORE .- Last Friday evening the Russian schooner Zeriba when sailing over the bar on her passage outward grounded on the South Beach. The steam tug Victor went to her assistance but could not tow her off. Next day a survey was held, and it was decided to discharge a part of her cargo and make another attempt to get her off at next high tide. About half her deck load was discharged, and in the afternoon the tugs Victor and St. Lawrence succeeded in towing her off. She appeared to be uninjured. On the same evening the Norwegian bark Rival went aground in about the same place. She was also lightened and towed off by the two tugs. A survey was afterwards held and the captain was advised that the vessel had suffered no injury. She is now lying outside the bar completing her cargo.

Wm. Girvan, of Galloway, Takes His Own Life.

The people of this vicinity were shocked last Monday morning to hear that Mr. Wm. Girvan, of Galloway, had been found dead in bed with his throat cut from ear to ear. Mr. Girvan's wife died last spring since which time he has been living with his adopted son, a young man of about twenty. Mr. Girvan has since the death of his wife been very despondent and the inquest revealed the fact that he has several times threatened to commit suicide. These threats were, however, attributed to grief and despondency, and no one who heard them appeared to think that he contemplated any such step. On Wm. Smith, who were working with a threshing machine, went up to the room of deceased to ask him something about the machinery. They found him lying across the bed with a deep gash in his throat. They at once gave the alarm, and Mr. Wm. Parkhill a neighbor was the first to touch the body. The right hand of deceased was lying on his head, his left held the razor which had done the work. The right jugular was severed. The blood had spurted over the left hand and ran down the arm. Deceased left handed. These facts convinced the corner's jury that there had been no foul play, but that the deceased had taken his own life. A coroner's jury consisting of John Fraser, Wm. Parkhill, Thomas Vanstone, Alex. Lennox, Robert Glendenning, Jonathan Glendenning and John Glendenning was impanelled, and an inquest held before Coroner I. W. Doherty, M D. R. A. d'Olloqui, M. D., John W. Girvan, (son of deceased), Wm. Smith, Samuel Girvan and Thomas Girvan were sworn and detailed the facts as above. The jury were unanimous in the verdict that deceased came to his death by cutting his own throat with a razor. The report of the affair as published in Moncton and St. John papers, hinting that the adopted son had done the deed in order to obtain his father's property, do great injustice to the young man. No one here for a moment believes such a thing. Deceased was 69 years of age.

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
