SMELT FISHING LICENCES.—Mr. Robert A. Chapman, Inspector of Fisheries intends being at Buctouche on the 25 inst., to issue smelt fishery licenses for the coming season to those requiring the same. From Buctouche he will go to Cocagne. He will be at Shediac on the 28th.

PROBATE COURT.—At a sitting of the Probate Court held before Judge H. H. Jones here last Thursday, judgment was given in the John Joseph Thompson contested will case. The decree declared the will invalid on account of improper attestation, and revoked the administration cum testamento annexo granted to the widow last winter.
