Hon. John Costigan was presented with a life sized portrait of himself at the Royal Hotel, St. John, Friday afternoon. The presentation was made by K. F. Burns, on behalf of Mr. Costigan's friends; Miss McCarthy of St. John is the artist.

Black Water river, county Cork, overflowed, and adjacent stretches of country are inundated for miles. In the town of Ferny there is almost utter darkness as the gas works are submerged. Many inhabitants of the flooded region are removing their household goods to higher ground.

At Lete, Charlotte Co., during a storm on Friday night a boat manned by Percy Hatt, James Hyds and Wm. Hicks drove ashore at Mohawk Island, Letete. Hatt was drowned but the others saved themselves. They were obliged to stay on the island all night without shelter and with only an undershirt to protect them.

Several noblemen in England are in the habit of giving special orders to makers in Virginia for their supply of smoking tobacco. There is no doubt that by that means they get the very best tobacco to be had, but it costs them about \$2 a pound. The workman of Canada are smoking the very same quality of tobacco at 75 cents a pound, and it is known to them by the name of "Myrtle Navy."

A daring robbery was committed at the Intercolonial Railway station at River du Loup, Thursday night. While the station agent was engaged alone in counting his cash and making up his receipts for the day, a stranger entered, and before the agent could guard himself, struck him a violent blow with a stick which knocked him almost senseless, and hurled him against the iron safe in the office. His assailant then seized the money, amounting to about \$100, and made off with it, as he did also with a horse from the stable of a neighbor.

The enthroning of the Right Reverend H. T. Kingston as Lord Bishop of Fredericton, successor to the late Bishop Medley, took place at the Cathedral at Fredericton on Wednesday, at 11 o'clock. A special ceremonial and order of prayer prepared for the occasion, was followed by the service of holy communion. The bishop of Maine and other prominent clergymen took part in the services and ceremonies. Rev.

Canon Brigstock preached the sermon. A large number of the Episcopal clergymen of the Maritime provinces were present on the occasion.

The Empire's Halifax correspondent says that at the conference between members of the Canadian and Newfoundland governments, which came to an end in that city Tuesday night, the question of co-federation was considered, and a basis of terms of union agreed upon. The Newfoundland delegates will submit it to their government, and if accepted by it the question will be submitted to a plebiscite of the people. The Newfoundlanders want a per capita allowance equal to their proportion of the Dominion debt which would be equal to \$9,000,000 and they want the Dominion to undertake the completion of the railway across the island to Hales bay, a distance of 300 miles.

The trial of G. L. Kelley, of Andover, for assault on a companion named Walter Scott on election day, took place at Andover on Thursday before Judge Stevens. Kelley and Scott, it will be remembered, had a fight. A few days later Scott died, and then it was remembered that Kelly had struck him several times with a hammer and pushed him through a window, scratching his wrist. An examination was held and death found to have resulted from blood-poisoning. Kelley was arrested and tried for assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm. After hearing all the evidence, the jury returned a verdict of malicious assault without intent to do grievous harm, and Judge Stevens sentenced the prisoner to jail for one year.

All the saw mills in and near Campbellton have been closed for the season, writes a correspondent of the Journal of Commerce. The output, which was nearly all cedar shingles, was large, in fact more than was profitable, as the market has been very dull since August. Looking back over the season that has just closed the correspondent is able to say that the town has shown considerable growth, notwithstanding the dismissals from the I. C. R. in the spring. More men were employed there during the summer than in any previous year. Quite a number of small cottages have been planned and are now in course of erection. The river is still open, but ice is running and navigation has practically closed for the year. Millmen have large crews of lumbermen in the woods cutting for next year's operations.

Councillor Wathen has been awarded the contract for the building of a bridge at Little Forks, Salmon River, and in consequence has been spending some time there of late.

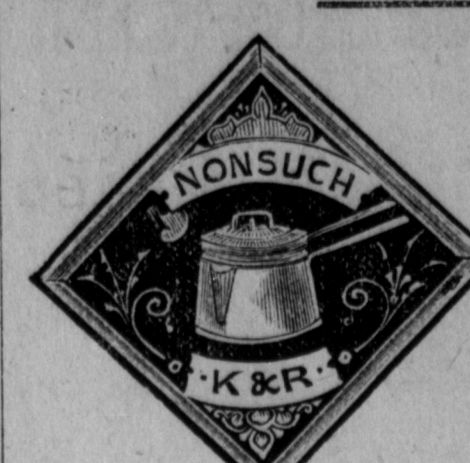
Rev. Dr. Wilson, of St. John, spent a few hours here last week visiting the Methodist parsonage and other places, on his way to Chatham.
