## MR. LABILLOIS' DENIAL.

The recent Kent election campaign and the utterances alleged to have been made by several of the speakers therein, came up for discussion in the House of Assembly Tast Friday, and the issues of that contest were there fought over again. Mr. La-Billois made a half-hearted denial of the charges made against him, concerning his statements at St. Louis, St. Mary, and other places in this county, and denied that he had sought to arouse race or relig- Quebec. ions strife until forced to do in self desence. The language alleged to have been used by Mr. Labillois at St. Mary is very strong, very bitter, and very fanatical, and we sincerely hope that he may be able to disprove it. But his mere statement is not enough. We have the direct and positive assertions of Mr. Phinney, Dr. Stockton, Father Onillet, the parish priest at St. Mary and several others who were present, that Mr. Labillois did on that occasion use the language attributed to him. We have the statement of Dr. Legere, M. P. for this county, that he was present at St. Louis, and that Mr. Labillois there used language even stronger and more anatical than that alleged to have been used at St. Mary. The doctor declares he then and there wrote down the words, and has left at the office of THE REVIEW a statement of the same over his own sig nature. A number of the most respectable men of St. Louis, who were present and heard Mr. Labillois speech, corroborate Dr Legere's statement. Against all this we have the unsupported denial of Mr. Labillois. The people of this province, Catholic and Protestant alike, have a right to know the truth of the matter. Mr Labillois is a member of the executive council of this province, and Mr. Blair, who is responsible for all his acts and utterances, owes it to the country to institute an inquiry to ascertain the truth or falsity of the charges.

### DR. STOCKTON'S UTTERANCES AT BASS RIVER.

Mr. Blair repeated in the Assembly the statements made by him to the electors of Buctouche on the evening after the recent local election in this county. He there declared that Dr. Stockton had a few days before at Bass River made a most inflammatory speech, endeavoring to arouse religious prejudices, referring to the Bathurst school difficulty, and on these grounds urging the Protestants to vote wainst the government. Mr. Stockton was not present at Buctouche on that oceasion, but he took the earliest opportunity afterwards to deny the accusation, and has now on the floors of the Assembly denied that he ever used such language, and demanded from the attorney general his authority for the statement. Mr. Blair in reply stated that Charles J. Sayre and John Stevenson, were present at Bass River and heard what Dr. Stockton had there said, and were prepared to make eath to it. Dr. Stockton then read the affidavits of a number of the electors of Bass River, who had been present at his Bass River meeting, each and all of them declaring the absolute falsity of the charge. He then challenged Mr Blair to produce the affidavits of Mr. Stevenson or Mr. Sayre in support of the charge. The attorney general will have some difficulty, we fear, in producing these affidavits. o for two very good reasons. In the first place, Dr. Stockton never used any such language, and secondly neither Mr. Stevenson nor Mr. Sayre were present at his Bass River meeting.
