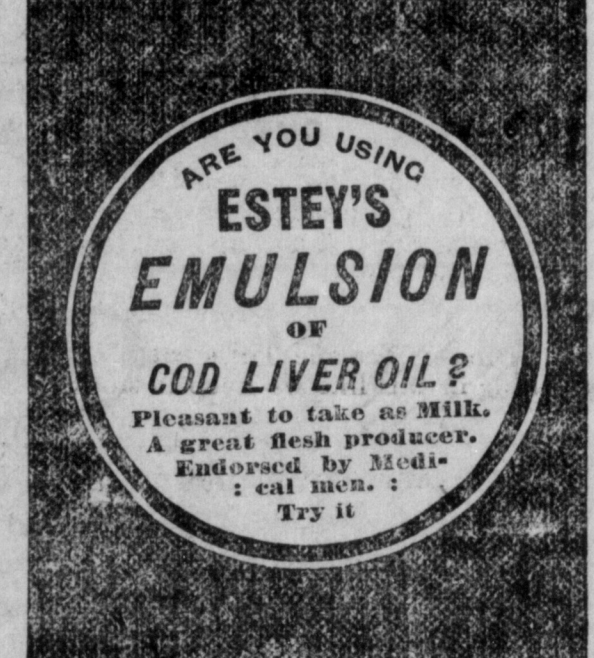

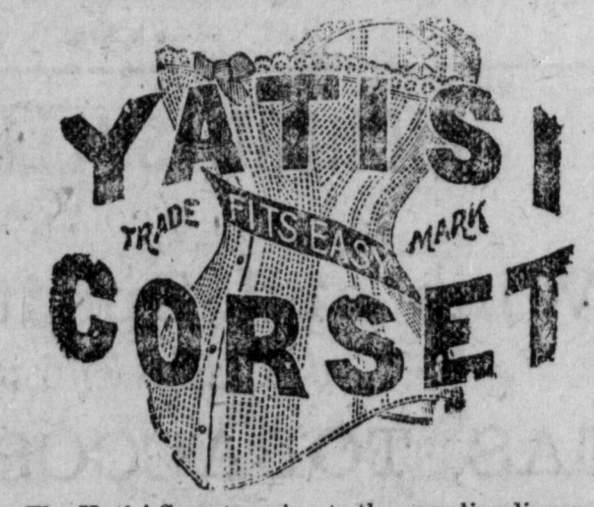

—A letter from Captain John Robinson of the bark Assyria, reports that the cargo of the vessel was completely destroyed by fire at a port in Japan. The vessel was also badly injured. She is now lying there undergoing repairs.

—Mr. F. W. Daniel, of the Bank of Nova Scotia, in Campbellton, is paying 5 cents apiece for live rats, for the amusement of his thorough-bred fox terriers. Here is a chance for the opening of a new enterprise likely to prove rough on rats.

—Polycap Martin, chief of the Mic-mac band of Indians at Mission Point, P. Q., while at work on Mr. Geo. Moffat's new mill at Dalhousie, recently, fell some thirty feet badly shattering his left arm. Dr. Doherty, Campbellton, attended the injured man.

—Mr. John Thompson, of Bathurst, has a promising two-year-old stallion. He was sired by Red Mack, son of the famous, Red Wilkes; dam, Jennie Middleton. Judging by appearances and by his pedigree, he will at no distant day make a good trotting record.

—Letters of administration with the will annexed of the estate and effects of John Jacob Thompson, late of the parish of Weldford, were granted to his widow, Margaret E. Thompson, by Judge James, last Thursday—Phinney & Carter, proctors for administratrix.

—A dispatch from San Francisco says that Mr. Alex. J. Loggie, of Chatham, who went to Los Angeles for his health last fall, died on Friday at his brother's in San Francisco. Mr. Loggie was consumptive. He leaves a wife and four children at home. He was an honest, straightforward business man, and much beloved by his circle of friends.—World.

—The heaviest storm of the season, if not for years, prevailed Thursday and Friday of last week. The wind, which blew at a terrific rate, was accompanied with snow, large quantities of which fell, forming some huge drifts. As all the roads were completely blocked, travel was suspended. The Harcourt mail due here Friday morning did not reach town until Saturday evening, which, under the circumstances, was good work. The K. N. R. only missed one regular trip.

—Maxim L. Basterash of the Parish of Wellington was arrested last week charged with setting fire to the school house in Black River and was taken before stipendiary Landry at Buctouche for his preliminary hearing. At the time appointed for the hearing no one appeared to prosecute and although prisoner's counsel demanded to see the complaint on which the arrest was made it was not produced.
