FREDERICTON, March 3
To-day being fixed by proclamation for
the opening of the Legislature there was
a fair attendance of members in the
Council Chamber when His Honor the
Lieutenant Governor delivered the fol-
lowing speech:

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen
of the Legislative Council:
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House
of Assembly:

I meet you with pleasure upon your
again assembling for the discharge of your
legislative duties, relying with confidence
upon your zeal and ability in the public
service.

The untimely death of the Duke of
Clarence, heir-presumptive to the throne
a few weeks ago, created a feeling of pro-
found sorrow throughout the empire. On
behalf of the people of this province, I
caused to be conveyed to Her Majesty and
Royal parents, an assurance of our sym-
pathy in their affliction, to which I have re-
ceived a most gracious acknowledgment in
reply.

I regret to say that the lumber industry
of the province has not yet emerged from
the depression with which it has been af-
fected, nor do I see any immediate pros-
pect of improvement. I am, however,
happy in being able to congratulate you
upon the abundant harvest of the past
year.

I have much satisfaction in informing
you that the commission appointed two
years ago to enquire into the report upon
the general management of our Crown
timber lands have concluded their labors
and their conclusions will be immediately
communicated to you. It is not improb-
able that during the session some legisla-
tion will be proposed for consideration in
connection with the recommendations of
the commission.

I am gratified at being able to inform
you that the Mining Law enacted last ses-
sion, and which has been therefore less
than twelve months in operation, has al-
ready given a marked impetus to the
leasing of mining areas and to mining ex-
ploration generally. I look with some
confidence for a substantial development
in this direction during the season upon
which we are now entering.

The disappointing results of the census,
from which it had been confidently ex-
pected that a large addition to the Do-
minion annual subsidy would have been
secured, has been a subject of much con-
sideration by my government. While re-
cognizing the importance of maintaining
permanently the equilibrium between in-
come and expenditure, it has been deem-
ed by my government none the less im-
portant that additional means be found to
further assist the dairying and kindred
agricultural interests, so as to diminish if
possible the outflow of our farming popu-
lation. To this end a measure has been
prepared, and will be laid before you for
augmenting the revenue from sources
hitherto undrawn upon, to which I invite
your careful attention.

The claim against the government of
the Dominion in connection with the
Eastern Extension matter, so called, is, I
regret to say, still unpaid. My govern-
ment has not ceased to urgently press its
payment upon the government at Ottawa,
but so far, without success.

The obligation resting upon the state to
provide for the education of the blind and
deaf and dumb has already been recog-
nized by the government and the people
of the province, but not, I am led to be-
lieve, to the extent demanded by the
growing needs of these dependent classes.
A measure relating to the subject has been
prepared and will be submitted for your
approval.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House
of Assembly:

Under the authority conferred at the
last session of the Legislature, a very ex-
tensive importation of pure bred stock of
the various standard breeds was made
from the sister provinces of Ontario and
Quebec. The quality of the animals im-
ported is admitted to have been of a very
high order, and their distribution through-
out the province cannot fail to be of gen-
eral benefit. The accounts in detail in
connection with the importation will be
laid before you.

I have directed the accounts of the
income and expenditure of the past year
as well as a statement of the receipts and
payments of the current year, up to the
opening of the present session, to be laid
before you.

Estimates of the probable income and
expenditure of the current year will be
submitted to you, and I think you will
find that the estimates of expenditure
have been prepared with a due regard to
economy and the requirements of the
public service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen
of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House
of Assembly:

Bills have been prepared—
To declare the rights of the Crown, as
represented by the government of the
province, in certain public lands and prop-
erty.

For the substitution of insurance, poli-
cies of guarantee companies for bonds with
sureties in the case of public officers:

Relating to bills of sale;
which will be submitted for your consid-
eration and approval.

A bill is also in course of preparation
and may be ready to lay before you at
the present session, adopting the provi-

sions of the English Judicature Acts, so far
as they may be made applicable to the
courts of the province, and making uni-
form the practice of the Supreme and
County courts.

I am confident that these measures, and
the subjects to which I have invited your
attention, will receive every consideration
at your hands.

FREDERICTON, March 4.
Yesterday afternoon Hon. Mr. Pug-ley
introduced a bill to secure to wives and
children the benefit of life insurance.

Mr. Legere, member-elect for Kent, was
introduced by Hon. Mr. Blair and Mr.
Labllois and sworn in.

Mr. Burchill moved, seconded by Mr.
Legere, the address in reply to the speech.
Hon. Mr. Hanington followed, in con-
demnation of the government, Hon. Mr.
Blair, in its defence; Mr. Stockton, Dr.
Atkinson and Mr. Alward in succession
assailed the government position, but ob-
tained no reply from the government side,
and the debate was adjourned until this
afternoon.

After routine to-day Hon. Mr. Blair
introduced the bill authorizing the accept-
ing of policies of guarantee companies as
security for the faithful conduct of public
officers.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Mitchell, it was
ordered that 400 copies of journals be
published for the use of the Legislature.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted a mem-
orandum of agreement with Messrs. Mc-
Dade and Risteen for reporting and pub-
lishing debates.

Mr. Blair said the committee appointed
to revise the rules had about finished their
labors and their report was nearly ready.
Some of the changes suggested might cause
considerable discussion. One of the chang-
es proposed, he understood, was that the
ordinary meetings of the House should
not begin until half-past two o'clock daily.
The object of that change was to enable
the committee to get through their work
before the sessions of the House began. It
was thought on all sides that the proposed
change would greatly facilitate the transac-
tion of the business of the Legislature.

If agreeable to all, that amended rule
might be adopted immediately, before the
whole report of the committee on rules
came up for consideration. He there-
fore moved "That the time for the ordi-
nary meeting of the House shall be 2.30
p. m. daily (Sundays and holidays except-
ed), and if at that time there be not a
quorum the Speaker may take the chair
and adjourn. When the House rises on
Saturdays it shall stand adjourned, unless
otherwise ordered until the following
Monday."

Mr. Hanington inquired if under the pro-
posed change it was intended to adopt the
Ottawa system of continuing the sittings
of the House until after midnight. That
was a matter he knew rested entirely with
the leader of the government.

Mr. Blair said he thought it would be
found that neither the government nor its
supporters would want to continue at
work much longer than the members of
the opposition. The proposed change
would shorten the hours of work.

Mr. Hanington seconded the motion,
which was carried unanimously.

Another resolution was carried that rule
70 be repealed and that orders of the day
shall be taken up as soon as routine busi-
ness is disposed of unless another hour has
been fixed by the House for the taking up
of any adjourned order of the day.

FREDERICTON, March 5.
Mr. Stockton yesterday afternoon, in-
troduced a bill to prevent and punish
wrongs to children.

Mr. Alward resumed the consideration
of the address in reply to the speech from
the throne. He censured the government
for the condition of the province's fi-
nancial affairs, and he accused Hon. Mr.
Labllois of having used language in the last
Kent election calculated to raise religious
dissensions.

This brought on a warm discussion, each
side accusing the other of raising the re-
ligious cry. Hon. Mr. Labllois replied to
Mr. Alward, denied what he had
been accused of saying, and
accused Mr. Alward's friends of being
themselves guilty. Mr. Melanson said
Hon. Mr. Labllois was to blame. Mr.
Phinney said the same.

Mr. Legere supported the address, and
the first five paragraphs were then adopt-
ed.

To the sixth paragraph, Hon. Mr. Han-
ington said he had an amendment to pro-
pose. He did not believe direct taxation
was necessary, but in any case before the
House should adopt the paragraph in the
speech it should have proper information.
The members of the House should have
an opportunity of expressing their opin-
ion for or against direct taxation. He
would move as an amendment to the
sixth paragraph to add the following:

But we are not prepared to admit that it is ne-
cessary or expedient to augment the provincial
revenues by resort to a system of direct taxation.

Mr. Hanington assailed the government
for its course in connection with public
works, and asked for a fair tribunal to in-
vestigate the Central Railway charges.

Mr. Turner seconded the amendment.

Hon. Mr. Blair said if Mr. Hanington
had any charges to make, he should in
fairness take the proper and constitu-
tional way of bringing them before the
House. The course the hon. member has
taken is entirely without precedent in
moving this amendment to the address.
The hon. members were jumping before
