Accused of Selling Diseased Meat. Balome Robichaud, of St. Mary, was last Monday taken before Stipendiary John P. Legere in Buctouche charged with selling diseased meat. Mr. George V. McInerney appeared for Mr. Robichaud and H. H. James for prosecutor. Mr. McInerney demanded to see the information but this was refused him. The case was then postponed for a week. The Justices in Buctouche appear to have a practice peculiar to their own courts. At the hearing of the charge against Maxim Basterache for setting fire to a school house in Black River, before Stipendiary D. D. Landry, a few weeks ago, no information was produced when demanded by prisoner's counsel. Evidently criminals do not get much favor shown them in Wellington.

Lecture. Capt. H. W. Craigie, late 1st Regt. Light Horse, South Africa, delivered a lecture in the Temperance Hall here last Friday evening. His subject was the Kafir war and his experience and adventures in South Africa. Capt. Craigie first gave an account of the events which led to the war, and afterwards gave a very graphic description of the great battle of the Umzizani in which he took part and in which about thirty British soldiers routed the whole Kafir army. Amongst other incidents he described an exciting adventure with a tiger and a friendly meeting with a baboon. Afterwards he gave a description of diamond mining and ostrich farming in South Africa. Capt. Craigie is no mean singer, and at the conclusion of his lecture he brought down the house by singing a number of comic songs.
