INTERESTING PARAGRAPHS CULLED FROM VARIOUS FIELDS.

Coffee as a Disinfectant—A Simple and Inexpensive Means of Purifying the Air—Electricity from Niagara—To Tell How Fast a Steamer Goes.

Lady M. L. W. writes extolling the virtues of coffee as a disinfectant. She says: "I feel sure you will be ready to make known through your columns the use of coffee as an excellent disinfectant. A physician ordered its use many years ago, and I have four times over proved its efficacy in serious cases of measles, which so treated, never extended beyond the one patient. I also used it with great advantage during the influenza epidemic of the last two years, and I firmly believe it prevents the extension of infection, by changing and purifying the air with stimulating aromatic smell, which lasts some time, and which nothing can escape. Two or three red hot cinders in a dustpan sprinkled over with, say, a quarter of a teaspoonful of ground coffee at a time, not enough to flame, but simply make a good smoke, not more than three or four teaspoonfuls in all, will in five minutes, if used, say, at the bottom of a staircase, the room doors being previously opened, pervade the whole house. Gently shaking the dustpan promotes the volume of smoke. Two servants do this regularly morning and evening, with very little trouble and trifling expense. In infectious illness, such as I have alluded to, coffee is also burned on landing outside the invalid's room. I hope this simple suggestion may become widely known and largely adopted."

ELECTRICITY FROM NIAGARA.

Transmission of Power to Distant Points Not Profitable.

In discussing the probable use of the power that will be obtained from Niagara Falls, a writer in the Electrical World declares that it is not at all probable that power will be electrically transmitted to Chicago, as suggested, or to any other distant points. While such transmission is entirely feasible from an electrical point of view, the cost and waste of such a plan would render it a profitless undertaking.

Supposing the pressure at the secondary of the Niagara Falls transformer to be 50,000 volts, and allowing a loss on line of 20 per cent. due to resistance and a loss at the Chicago transformer of 10 per cent., and leaving loss by leakage out of the calculation, it is found that a copper wire about one-third of an inch in diameter would be required to deliver 1000 net horse power to the motor at the Fair. The weight of this wire would be about 1,250 tons for a synchronous motor.

Should the power of Niagara Falls be utilized, as is promised, and if it be sold at a reasonable rate, Buffalo bids fair to become the electrical city. It is not 25 miles from the Falls and electrical energy in 1000 horse power, units (providing a potential of 50,000 volts were used), could be carried into the heart of the city with a loss of ten per cent. on the Buffalo transformer and but two per cent. loss on the line with a No. 4 copper wire weighing about 15 tons.

To Tell How Fast a Steamer Goes. Among the various systems of signals required on board the ocean greyhounds one of the most important is a convenient means of determining quickly and accurately the number of revolutions of the engine shaft or shafts without waiting to count each turn. An ingenious electric device to accomplish this has recently been invented by an Englishman.

A circular contact maker is fitted to the shaft and over it work two contact brushes, so that each revolution of the shaft the circuit is made and broken four times. In the circuit is placed an electrical clock-work, and when the button is pushed at one of the stations the counting circuit is thrown in. The apparatus begins to count the instant the button is pushed, the operation lasting fifteen seconds. At the end of that time figures appear at the openings of the indicator, and show the exact number of revolutions per minute.

When the button is pressed again the last indication is automatically cleared away and the wheels set at zero. A number of indicators may be placed on the same circuit, but while a record is being taken on one the others are locked automatically to prevent the upsetting of the record being made. The tests made with the device on English warships have been very successful, and engineers say that it fully meets every requirement.

Hogskin for Walls. "Hogskin leather," says Hyde and Leather, "is becoming fashionable for wall paper, in the homes of the rich. This may sound odd, but it is true nevertheless. Few people know what beautiful leather may be manufactured under skilful management from the skin of the hog, which closely resembles human skin. Mr. P. H. Martin, of Cincinnati, an authority on hogskins, said: 'Hogskins are shaved down and turned into a soft, velvety leather, which is embossed or stamped artistically, and owing to its peculiar grain, a very pleasing and rich effect is produced. The skins are tanned in bark liquors in about six weeks. They are considerably used for saddle seats, horse collars and other harness leathers. Some of the skins we obtain are immense. I remember one that weighed 133 pounds, and measured 6 1/2 feet from head to tail. Another was 140 pounds, and contained 71 square feet of leather when finished. Here is a piece 1 1/2 inches thick. It is a decided curiosity.' As regards prices, we got \$12 a dozen skins for hogskin collar leather, and \$20 to \$25 a dozen for seating."

India Rubber Pavement. A German engineer has paved a bridge with india rubber, and the result has been so satisfactory that it is to be applied on a large scale. It is found to be more durable than asphalt, and not slippery. A section of roadway under the gate leading to the departure platform of the St. Pancras Terminus, London, has for some years past been paved with india rubber, and many people must have been pleasantly surprised at the deadening of sound when passing over it on wheels, and at the grateful elasticity to the tread when traversing it on feet.

He Stopped His Paper.

When the New York Tribune was in the height of its popularity, a subscriber took offence at some editorial and ordered his paper discontinued. He called upon Horace Greeley to inform him of this act of vengeance. "I have stopped your paper, sir," said the irate countryman. "Dear me!" said Mr. Greeley, with affected concern, "stopped my paper! I hope you will not do that. It would put me to great inconvenience. Have you really stopped it?" "I have, sir," said the subscriber, swelling with gratified importance. Mr. Greeley took the man through the Tribune building, showed him scores of men busily at work with the great presses running off thousands of copies, and all the vast machinery in full operation. Turning to the visitor, he said: "I thought you told me you had stopped my paper. Everything seems to me to be running as usual." "I meant," said the man somewhat abashed, "that I stopped my copy of your paper." "Oh," said Mr. Greeley, "that is a matter of complete indifference to me," and he politely bowed him out.

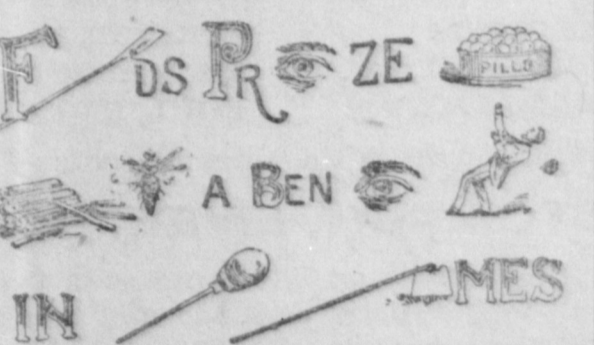
