Hogskin for Walls.

"Hogskin leather," says Hide and Leather, "is becoming fashionable for wall paper, in the homes of the rich. This may sound odd, but it is true nevertheless. Few people know what beautiful leather may be manufactured under skilful management from the skin of the hog, which closely resembles human skin. Mr. P. H. Martin, of Cincinnati, an authority on hogskins, said: 'Hogskins are shaved down and turned into a soft, velvety leather, which is embossed or stamped artistically, and owing to its peculiar grain, a very pleasing and rich effect is produced. The skius are tanned in bark liquors in about six weeks. They are considerably used for saddle seats, borse collars and other harness leathers. Some of the skips we obtain are immense. I remember one that weighed 133 pounds, and measured 62 feet from head to tail. Another was 140 pounds, and contained 71 square feet of leather when finished. Here is a piece 14 inches thick. It is a decided curiosity. As regards prices, we get \$12 a dozen skins for hogskin collar leather, and \$20 to \$35 a dozen for seating."

India Rubber Pavement.

A German engineer has paved a bridge with india rubber, and the result has been so satisfactory that it is to be applied on a large scale. It is found to be more durable than asphalt, and not slippery.
