RICHIBUCTO, N. B., JULY 14, 1892 THE PROPOSED HOME RULE BILL Ever since the last general election, Mr. Gladstone has been urged by his friends to give an outline of his proposed Home Rule scheme. His opponents have often taunted him, and openly charged that he was afraid to comply with the request of

his supporters. To both friends and opponents he has contended that he was not bound to go into the details of the meaure until the proper tim e arrived. True to his promise, he has now given to the press a summary of the proposed bill. The provisions of the new bill are very similar to those of the one defeated in 1886, the most important difference being in the clause providing for the retention of Irish representatives in the Imperial Parliament. Another important alteration is made by providing that denominational education cannot be interfered with by the Irish Parliament. Neither can it deal with any denominational question or impose disabilities or confer privileges on account of religious belief. These alterations will do much to make the scheme more acceptable to the people of Great Britain and the Protestants of Ulster. The latter cannot now complain that their rights will be ignored or interfered with by the Catholic majority, and the fact that Irish representatives will continue to sit at Westminster gives to the measure less of the appearance of a total separation. To meet the threats of the Ulster convention, the bill contains the further provision that the police and military forces of the empire are to be placed at the disposal of Ireland to enforce payment of taxes and obedience to the laws and decrees of its parliament The judicial committee of the privy council is the tribunal chosen to arbitrate on all disputes that may arise between the two parliaments. It is difficult to understand why there should be so great a prejudice in the minds of Englishmen against Home Rule, or why people should look upon it as tending to disintegrate the empire. It is admitted that the British Parliament has more work on its hands than can be attended to. Every year important measures are introduced, and allowed to die simply because there is not time to consider them. Local affairs take up much of the time that should be given to much needed legislation affecting the nation at large. Complaint is frequently made that Ireland and its affairs take up far too much of the time of the House, and yet when the Irish ask to be allowed to manage their own local affairs, the Unionists pretend to fear it would be exceedingly dangerous to grant them this right. People on this side of the Atlantic who are familiar with the federal system and its advantages find it difficult to understand how the Protestant minority in Ireland under Home Rule would be in any different position from the Protestant minority in the province of Quebec or the Catholic minority in New Brunswick. In Canada we have had provincial home rule for a quarter of a century, and as yet there has been no complaint that the minority in any province has been unjustly dealt with. Not more than half of the constitencies have been heard from and the result of the contest is still uncertain, but the returns so far show that the feeling in favor of allowing Ireland a local parliament is growing. Scotland, too, has now a Home Rule Association, and the people of Wales are beginning to demand a certain measure of local self government. The tendency of the day is toward federalization, and it is possible that before many years England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales will be united under a federal system similar to our own, each having its Totals......950 991 \$7,221,238 \$8,612,389

Buctouche School Examination,

BUCTOUCHE, July 4.—Last Thursday was entirely devoted to the semi-annual public examination in the two depart. ments of Buctouche school. The morning was spent in the primary department, in charge of Miss Celina Bourque. Not very many visitors were present. The examination was chiefly conducted by the principal and was very satisfactory. In the afternoon a large number of parents visited the superior department, now in charge of Mr. A. E. Pearson, of Sussex. Principal Pearson, who has only been with us six months, has won his way into the hearts of children' parents and the young folk of Buctouche, so the room was filled with interested persons.

Throughout the whole examination, Principal Pearson took care to show that there was no preparation made. All the different grades were examined in the various subjects of reading, spelling, writing, book-keeping, arithmetic, algebra, drawing, history and useful knowledge.

The examination from beginning to end was an interesting review of the last six month's work. A feeling of interest seemed to animate the whole school.

At the close of the examination the principal called Theresa Smith to the front and in a few well chosen remarks presented her with a volume of Tennyson's Poems for regularity of attendance.

Mr. J. C. Ross, trustee and secretary of the school board, expressed himself as highly pleased with the work, and stated that it seemed more of an examination than those formerly held, which had consisted chiefly of recitations and dialogues.




