**VALUATORS' MEETING.**—Messrs. Legere, Jones and Bourgeois, the county valuers, met at the office of R. Hutchinson, Esq., Clerk of the Peace, last Thursday, to consider an appeal from the decision of the assessors of the parish of Richibucto in the assessments of Messrs. Henry O'Leary, John Taylor and others. They decided not to interfere with the assessments.

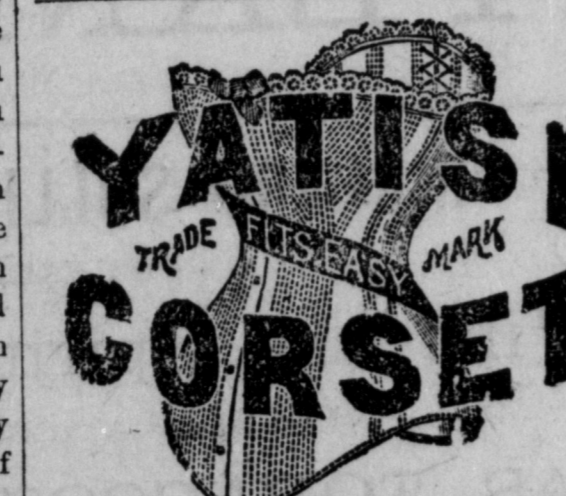

Two thirds of the business portion of the city is gone, and fully half of the entire city is destroyed. Three quarters of the whole value of St. John's is obliterated. The homeless, some 12,000, are sheltered in the parliament house and under sheds and tents in Bannerman Park and other open places.  
—The session of the Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada, which opens in St. John on Monday evening, August 1st, will, from present appearances, be largely attended. Arrangements are being made to secure the comfort of those who attend. Intending visitors should make early application for boarding houses, stating what price they wish to pay. Arrangements have been made for reduced fares by rail and steamer. A large gathering from Nova Scotia is promised, and the New Brunswick teachers are expected to be present in considerable force.—Educational Review.
