DIED AT SEA.—Mrs. George Fraser, of this town, has received the sad news of the death of her brother William E. Whitty, who died April 15, last, off Colaro, on the voyage from Calcutta to San Francisco, while in command of the ship Frank Penatlon. Captain Whitty was 43 years of age, a Richibucto boy and much respected by those who knew him.

THE ST. JOHN VALLEY.—Mr. Rainsford Wetmore, who is to have charge of the surveying of the St. John Valley Railway, expects to have his arrangements for beginning his work completed in a few days, certainly not later than the last part of this week. As soon as the line is permanently located another party will start out to complete the business of securing the right of way, and by the time the specifications are prepared all cases of right of way will have been settled, and the work will then be given out to the contractors.—Gleaner.

HEALTH RESTORED.—Mr. D. C. Sullivan, who on February left for the Southern States on account of ill health returned last evening, and his friends and acquaintances will be glad to hear that his health is fully restored. He left here on February 26th going to St. Louis, over the Sante Fe to Pasadena on the Pacific coast. From there he went to San Francisco, thence to Del Monte, a celebrated winter and summer resort, near Monterey. He visited Salt Lake City, Colorado Springs and parts of Arizona and New Mexico and journeyed through the northern part of California. SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS.—The examinations in the public schools of Richibucto will be held as follows:—In the primary department on Monday, June 27th, from 1 to 4 p. m. In the intermediate, on Tuesday, June 28th from 1 to 4 p. m. In the advanced, on Thursday, June 30th, from 9 to 12 a. m. In the grammar school, on Thursday, June 30th, from 1 to 4 p. m. Parents and guardians of the children, and all interested in education, are most cordially invited to be present. The grading examinations will take place on the following dates:—In the primary, for advancement to the intermediate, on Wednesday afternoon, June 22. In the intermediate, for promotion to the advanced, on Thursday afternoon, June 23. In the advanced, for the Grammar School, on Friday afternoon, June 24.

All desiring promotion will be in their respective classes on these dates.

N. B. SUPREME COURT.—Doe dem A. J. Girvan vs. John McLean. Mr. Phinney, Q. C., moved for non-suit pursuant to leave reserved; Mr. Sayre opposed the motion. One of the questions arising in this case is whether the six days notice required to be given to entitle a party to put in evidence a certified copy of a registered conveyance means six days before the actual trial or six days before the opening of the court. Court considers John Robertson and George Robertson vs. Oswald Smith. Mr. Sayre supported the appeal. Mr. Phinney, Q. C., contra. The respondent objected to the appeal being heard on the ground that the appellant had not filed a statement of the material facts and grounds of motion as required by rules of Michaelmas term 1885. The court allowed the case to stand till next term, the appellant to file statement in the meantime and pay costs of the day; otherwise the appeal to be dismissed with costs.

TO BE RESTOCKED WITH OYSTERS.—Shediac harbor is to be restocked with oysters and two English experts, Messrs. Kem and Bedeque, are at Shediac looking about the place with a view of planting oysters there. These gentlemen who have had much experience in this business, seemed perfectly satisfied with the place and the chances of success. The oysters will be got at Buctouche and Bedeque, P. E. I. They will be planted under the supervision of Inspector Chapman and work will be begun at once.

DROWNED AT COCACNE.—At Cocagne, on Thursday, Wildfred Bourgeois, brother of Mr. Simon Bourgeois, lobster and packing merchant, came in from the factory and having met a number of friends commenced drinking. About 10 o'clock accompanied by a couple of companions he went on board his boat. He was not seen afterwards, but his boat was found next day floating near by, which led to the suspicion that he was drowned. Parties searched for the body and on Saturday it was found but at short distance from where the boat lay. The unfortunate man while moving around the boat must have fallen overboard. He leaves a widow and two children. At the coroner's inquest, Dr. J. A. Leger testified that in his opinion deceased had met his death before he touched the water. The jury, however, brought in a verdict of accidental drowning.

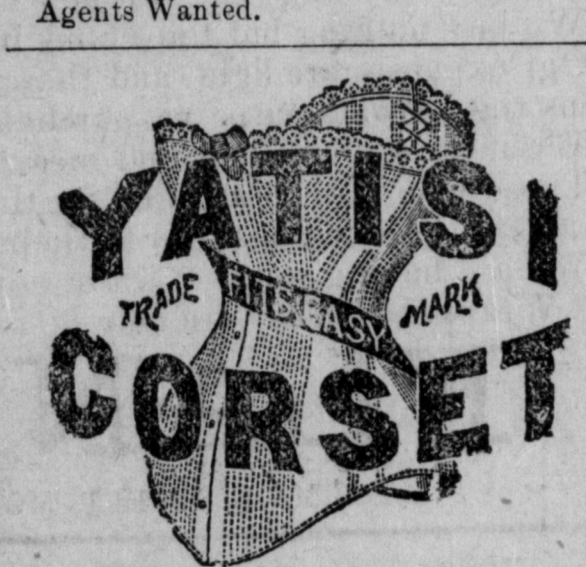

KENT COUNTY MAN DROWNED.—The remains of George Pickett, who was drowned at Greenville Junction, Me., on the 15th inst., were interred at Kouchibouguac, the deceased's former home, on Saturday, being accompanied by his sister and brother, Maggie and John. Pickett was a young man of 21 and was employed as caretaker of a boating club at Greenville jct. Last Wednesday an inebriated individual got into one of the club's boats and would not get out until Pickett had consented to row him around. When out a considerable distance from the shore the intoxicated man upset the boat. A small boat was put out from the shore but was not capable of taking on both. Young Pickett said he thought he could hold out until they had conveyed the other man to shore. On the return, just as the boat had reached him, he sank for the last time, being so nearly rescued that the man in the bow of the boat had grasped his hat as he was sinking. The family of the drowned man are at present living in the States, having removed there from Kouchibouguac last spring.
