

LOCAL & GENERAL.

A FIRE.—A fire started last Thursday in the sawdust on Mr. H. O'Leary's wharf. The wind was blowing hard but the engine was got into operation and the fire put out before it had gained much headway.

FIRE WARDENS MEETING.—At a meeting of the Fire Wardens of the town of Richibucto, held in the Masonic Hall, last Thursday evening, Mr. Wm. J. Smith was elected secretary of the board and Mr. H. O'Leary treasurer for the ensuing year. A resolution was passed that the officers be authorized to procure one hundred feet more of hose.

PUBLIC MEETING.—The public meeting called for last Wednesday week, to consider the advisability of petitioning the Dominion government to erect a public building in the town of Richibucto, was postponed until Thursday, the 21st instant. The county council will then be in session here, and a large attendance of our public men is requested.

ATTACKED AT NIGHT.—While Theo. LeBlanc was driving along the post road between Kingston and Galloway Hill last Thursday, an unknown man rushed out of the bushes and caught his horse by the bridle rein. Mr. LeBlanc gave the animal a blow with his whip and it broke away from the unknown man's grasp. A bullet from a revolver fired after him passed through the rim of LeBlanc's hat. In the darkness he was unable to see the face of his assailant.

COMMISSIONERS COURT.—Oswald Smith vs. William Malley, an action brought to recover for the services of the plaintiff's steam tug, was heard before commissioner John T. Caie on Saturday. Defendant tendered \$13 into court and claimed a set off against the balance. The jury returned a verdict of \$23. Geo. V. McInerney for plaintiff, and C. J. Sayre for defendant.

DIVORCE COURT.—Judge Fraser held divorce court at Fredericton last week. There were two cases, both of which were from Westmorland, presented for trial and both were undefended.

The first case was Botsford vs. Botsford. Mrs. Botsford, nee Carvell, daughter of Mr. Lewis Carvell, ex-superintendent of the Intercolonial railway, was the plaintiff. She is seeking a divorce from her husband, Dr. Robt. L. Botsford, of Moncton, on the ground of adultery. The principal witness was a young woman named Berry, who lived for some time in Moncton, and her evidence was direct to the point. Mr. Carvell was among the witnesses examined. The evidence disclosed the fact that Dr. and Mrs. Botsford were twice married; first by Rev. Thos. Todd, Baptist, at Moncton, and six months afterwards by an Episcopal clergyman at Shediac. Mr. Teed appeared for the plaintiff.

COUNTY COURT.—The Kent County Court opened here last Tuesday, Judge Landry presiding. There were two criminal cases. The Queen vs. Sylvain Babain for forgery and the Queen vs. Alexander Maillet for uttering forged documents. The civil docket was as follows:—

1 The Queen on complaint of George H. Morton vs. James McPherson. R. Barry Smith supports appeal from a conviction of Stipendiary Bailey.
 2 George N. Clark and George A. Lonsbury vs. James Johnson. H. H. James for plaintiff, Phinney & Carter for defendant.
 3 George Long vs. Archibald McKinnon. Phinney & Carter to shew cause, Curry & Vincent contra.
 The Queen on the complaint of George H. Morton vs. James McPherson was an appeal from a conviction of Stipendiary Bailey at Harcourt. Mr. R. Barry Smith appeared to support appeal. No one appeared to support the conviction and it was quashed with costs, which his Honor ordered to be paid within thirty days. The grand jury found true bills against both Maillet and Babain.

"Bessed are ye when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and say all manner of evil against you falsely," is a quotation that is very applicable to this case. "It is impossible but that offences shall come, but we unto him through whom they come."

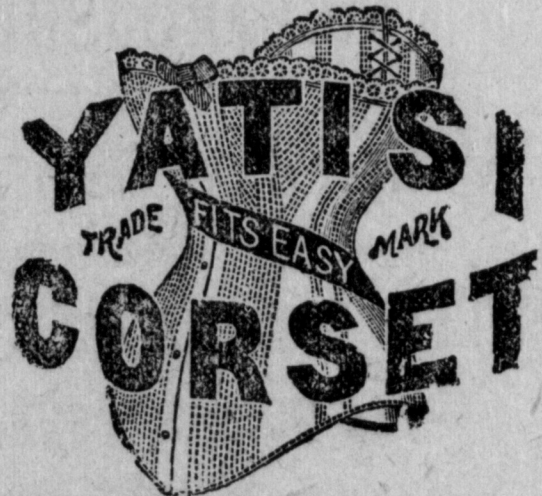
