A Scare.

The people of Richibucto were startled last Saturday morning by a report that a vessel direct from Santos, Brazil, and with yellow fever on board, had arrived at this port and was moored at Wark's wharf. It was learned, on enquiry, that the vessel was the "Saca." She sailed from Santos and arrived here after a voyage of fifty days. At Santos, one of the crew died of yellow fever, at there has been no sign of the disease since. One of the sailors was sick, and immediately on the arrival of the vessel he sent for a doctor. This is supposed to have given rise to the rumor which so alarmed the town.
