

LOCAL & GENERAL.

BROWN'S MILL.—Mr. James Brown has begun work on O'Leary's wharf, on the foundation of his mill, which will be removed from Weldford.

COMMISSIONER'S COURT.—The case of Oswald Smith vs. Wm. Malley, before Commissioner John T. Caie last Thursday, was postponed, on application of plaintiff, till the 24th inst.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY.—Gilbert A. Renaud and Robert Duplessis were each fined six dollars and costs before Justice Richard Sutton at Buctouche last week for assaulting and beating John Allen.

TO REMOVE TO KINGSTON.—Mr. Thos. Burns will remove his saw mill to Kingston. It will be located on Hutchinson's point. A well has already been drilled and work will begin on the foundation at once.

THUNDER AND LIGHTNING.—The thunder last Monday night was the heaviest that has been heard here for some time. The lightning was most vivid and kept the sky in almost a constant blaze. The heavy shower accompanying it did great good to the crops which had begun to feel the need of rain.

KENT DRIVING PARK.—Attention is called to the advertisement in this issue announcing that races will take place in the Kent Driving Park on July 13. The managers of the park are endeavoring to renew the old time vitality of this institution. The races held there last summer were highly successful, and in order that there might be no "kicking" or accusations of unfair dealing directed against the managers, they took pains to have appointed as judges, experienced men from the different provinces in no way connected with the institution. The plan worked well and will no doubt be adopted in future races. The track has been regraded and during the summer a new fence will be erected around it. When completed it will be one of the finest driving parks in the maritime provinces. It is hoped that the public will encourage the management in their efforts by a good attendance on the 13th, and that outside parties will help to make the day a success by entering some of their flyers.

CO-OPERATIVE DAIRYING.—A number of meetings for the encouragement of dairying are being held in Kent County, under the direction of the secretary for agriculture. Meetings will be held as follows: 17th inst., at St. Mary; 18th, Bass River; 20th, temperance hall, Kingston; 21st, Richibucto; 22nd, Kouchibouguac. Mr. W. W. Hubbard, one of the dairy instructors, will lecture on each occasion on co-operative dairying and the advantages of making butter and cheese in factories. The best system of feeding and the best crops to raise for that purpose; ensilage and silos. The lectures on these subjects, which are also being delivered in many sections of the province, are under the auspices of the government, and held with the view of forming local societies where practicable.

The following extracts were clipped from a circular letter issued some time ago by the Provincial Farmers' Association stating the existence of certain facts and asking the government to take some action in the matter. Hence the present work.

I. That the Province of New Brunswick does not produce enough of butter and cheese to supply her own markets.

II. That a large percentage placed on the market is not of that desirable quality which would ensure its sale at remunerative prices.

III. That a system of farming which entails the keeping of enough stock on the farm to consume all the fodder grown, and making possible the profitable purchase of such feed-stuffs as bran and linseed and cottonseed meal, must help to maintain and increase the fertility of the soil generally.

IV. That Dairy Farming, in its widest sense, is such a system, and will not only maintain the fertility of the soil but will also profitably employ a large number of hands at remunerative wages for the whole year. It will also bring large cash returns. Skill in the production of a high uniform quality of butter, cheese and meat, and business methods in marketing, will ensure good prices in both the foreign and domestic markets.

V. That in order that our farmers may become skillful in turning out choice products an interest in the work must be created among them, and that instructions as to the best known methods must be provided.
