NUGGETS.

The first "drift storm" this season occurred on Sunday last. Burns' new mill at Bathurst is being pushed forward rapidly.

Mr. Dickie (conservative) has been re-elected in Cumberland, N. S., by a large majority over Capt. Howard, the liberal candidate.

The Dominion government has purchased the Harris property at St. John for two hundred thousand dollars, for Intercolonial railway purposes.

Hon. Mr. Ouimet, conservative, has been elected by acclamation in Laval. His opponent, St. Amour withdrew from the contest on Saturday.

It is reported that Reid's mills will shortly be removed from Chatham to Dalhousie. Mr. Reid is an extensive manufacturer of doors, sashes, shingles, etc.

It is estimated that \$15,000.00 have been paid by J. Malcolm Forbes, of Boston, for the great stallion Arion. This is probably the largest amount ever paid for a horse.

Maclaren's drugstore was destroyed by fire at an early hour Monday morning. The fire was first seen by Mr. Roderick Robertson, who immediately gave the alarm. All the stock was destroyed. No insurance.

The fishermen are making fairly good catches of smelts, although they are of a small size. The Barnett brothers—Edward, Charles and Alexander—have been the most successful. They caught nearly a ton on Monday. Two and a half cents per pound is the price being paid for them now.

The smelt fishermen intend petitioning the government for an extension of time to March 1st, and are circulating a petition for that purpose, which is being numerously signed. The demand will probably be acceded to, owing to the total failure of the fishing the first part of the season, on account of the prolonged mild weather.

Mr. C. R. Hicks, of the I. C. R., who lives on High street, Moncton, received a telegram from Boston to the effect that his brother, Mr. Ambrose Hicks, a former resident of Butternut Ridge, had been killed while at his work in a foundry in Boston. It appears that the unfortunate man was scalded to death as the result of a boiler explosion in the foundry. The body is to be interred at Butternut Ridge.

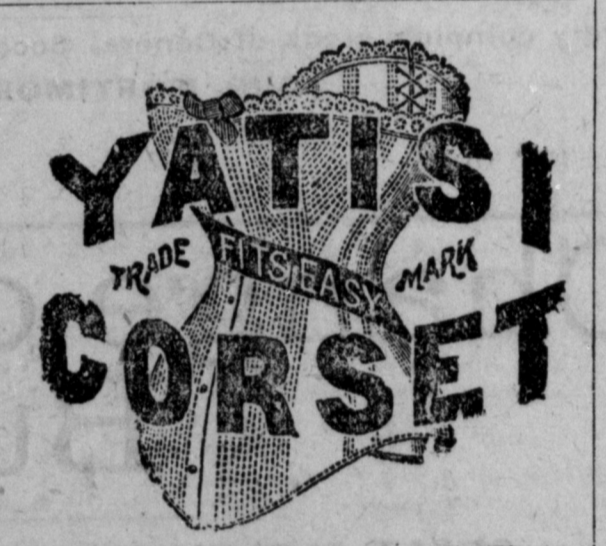
