THE WORLD'S POPULATION. An Estimate Made by Careful Statisticians of Germany. The latest and undoubtedly the most authoritative estimates of the population of the world give a total of nearly 1,480,000,000. We take these figures from the "Bevolkerung der Erde" of which the eighth issue has just been published by the well-known geographical establishment of Justus Perthes of Gotha. No statistical publication in the world is edited with more minute and pains-taking care. This volume covers 270 pages. Every statement is critically examined, the sources of all statistics are given, where various figures are presented the value of each is discussed and the greatest pains have been taken to secure the most reasonable estimates where trustworthy census returns were unobtainable. Many countries have no census, and Dr. Supan, the learned editor of Petermann's Mitteilungen, carried out special investigations as to population, dealing in this way with Africa, parts of America, Turkey in Europe and Asia, Arabia, China, and some other lands. It is learned from the conclusions presented by Drs. Supan and Wagner that a fairly precise enumeration has been made of 836,000,000 people, or nearly fifty-seven per cent. of the estimated total population of the world. The data for a very large area of inhabited parts are, therefore, based upon guesswork, and it is believed that the most satisfactory calculations may be in error by at least fifty millions one way or the other. The estimates of the world's population, however, are to-day upon a far more substantial foundation than was the case twenty years ago, and upon a greater number of carefully studied data. The progress of exploration has made more satisfactory computations possible. Stanley put the population of the Congo basin at 25,000,000, upon the strength of his knowledge of regions through which he had travelled. But since he published his "Congo Free State" his own explorations and those of others have revealed immense areas of sparsely populated forests which are thought to cover 300,000 square miles of the Congo basin. This fact and other data have been used to reduce the figures for the Congo's population to 14,000,000. Levasseur, the French statistician, in 1886 allowed a greater population to Asia and Africa than have Supan and Wagner. These estimates of Africa's population are 38,000,000 below those of Levasseur, and they have reduced the estimates for Asia by 15,000,000. They have made the greatest reduction in the case of China. The investigations of recent years have shown conclusively that the former ideas of China's population were greatly exaggerated, and the accepted figures have been reduced from 405,000,000 to 350,000,000. Some authorities, not many years ago, made the population of China 500,000,000. Drs. Wagner and Supan made an exhaustive analysis of all the facts obtainable, with the result that they strike over 50,000,000 from the population of the eighteen provinces of China proper. Their estimate of the total population of the world is 46,000,000 over that of the "Bevolkerung der Erde" for 1882 or an annual increase of 5,750,000. The latest data, so conscientiously collected and so critically examined as to inspire confidence that they afford the best approximation that can be made in our present state of information, give the following figures as the population of the great divisions of the earth's surface. Europe, 357,379,000, or 94 to the square mile. Asia, 825,954,000, or 47 to the square mile. Africa, 163,953,000, or 14 to the square mile. The Americas, 121,713,000, or 8 to the square mile. Australia, 3,230,000, or 1 to the square mile. Oceanic islands, 7,420,000, or 10 to the square mile. Polar regions, 80,400. Grand total, 1,479,729,400. Up to 1882 the "Bevolkerung der Erde" was issued about once in two years, but owing to the death of Dr. Behm, one of its editors, Dr. Wagner, his colleague, was unable to assume alone the great labor involved, and the publication was suspended until the present year, when Dr. Supan became associated with him.
