The Khedive's Death. CAIRO, Jan. 7.—The death of the Khedive of Egypt tonight was entirely unexpected. It is stated this evening that he was in no apparent danger from an attack of influenza when suddenly complications set in and developed with startling rapidity.

CAIRO, Jan. 11.—It is learned that Dr. Salem injected morphine on Wednesday night into the arm of the Khedive. Next morning the Khedive begged that the dose of morphine be repeated in order to allay pain. European physicians were summoned and found the patient's case hopeless. Dr. Salem, however, informed the ministers that the Khedive was recovering.

All the leading newspapers this morning confirm the report that the Khedive died from the effects of an overdose of morphine administered by a native physician.

The Keary House. A correspondent writing to the Moncton Times gives a sketch of the Keary House, Bathurst, one of the best arranged and most popular hotels in the country.

This house is splendidly arranged for a hotel, though it was built for a private residence by the late Wm. End, who was burned to death in his office here about fifteen years ago. About sixty-three years ago he built what is known to-day as the Keary House for his private residence. The floor of the spacious hallway is flagging of freestone, which was brought from Scotland all cut and ready to lay down. The room now used for smoking is deserving of a few comments. The elegant and venerable old franklin, which brought from Scotland 63 years ago, has never been moved, and is in perfect order; so, also, the paper on the walls, which represents the Lady of the Lake. It is said the paper for this room alone cost £70 sterling and it is well preserved, and, as Mr. Keary prizes it very highly, it may be in use for another half century. It would be difficult to form an idea of the number of people in Canada, the United States, and other countries, whose attention has not been attracted by the scenes presented on these walls. The workmanship and material throughout the whole house is of the very best character.
