THE DAIRY QUESTION.

Interest in the dairy question deepens in the upper provinces. Strenuous efforts are being still put forth to stimulate improvement in all branches of dairy work, both in Ontario and Quebec. In cheese production, these provinces already stand high. Canadian cheese takes the front rank in the English market, having won for itself a first rate reputation. The cheese of the Eastern Townships, Quebec, is among the best produced.

In butter manufacture Canada does not. take high rank. Here and there a good article is turned out, but, generally speaking, the output is inferior. Yet there is as fine a market for good butter in England as there is for good cheese; and Canada has facilities for good butter making quite equal to those for good cheese pro-


