Cathelicism In New Brunswick. [Condensed from United Canada.]

Among the prominent figures in the ecclesiastical history of Northern New Brunswick, must be mentioned the name of the Very Rev. Michael Egan, Vicar-General of the diocese of Chatham. His death, which took place on the 26th of August. 1887, at Nelson, Miramichi, N. B., in the 81st year of his age, the 59th of his priesthood and the 54th of his pastorate of St. Patrick's, Nelson, cast a profound gloom over the whole diocese, in which he bad so long, faithfully and fruitfully fabored. "Father Egan," says a local journal, was for many years after his arrival in 1833, a very prominent figure in Miramichi. Born in Kilkenny, Ireland, on the 21st December, 1806, after his preparatory studies in his native country he was sent for his theological course and clerical training to Portugal, where on the Ember Saturday of Trinity, June 13th, 1829, he was ordained priest; returning home he exercised the holy ministry in his n live diocese for four years. In response to an appeal for priests made to his bishop by Bishop McEachran in a letter written at Bartibogue when Father Dollard (afterwards Bishop) was the resident missionary priest of Miramichi, Father Egan, in company with the late Father Rienard Veriker, then in deacon's orders, came out from Ireland, via Halifax to St. Andrews, P. E. I., where Bishop McEachran then resided. The good bishop received the two rev. gentlemen with an affectionate, paternal welcome. Father Veriker was soon ordained priest and subsequently served, with zeal and success, missions in various parts of New Brunswick, Woodstock, Grand Falls, Chatham and finally in St. Andrews, N. B., where he died a few years since.

Father Egan was at first sent for a few months to aid Father Dunphy in St. John and the dependent missions; then he succeeded Father Dollard in the extensive missionary field of Miramichi and the Bay Chaleur, having his residence at the church and presbytery then but recently erected by Father Dollard at Nelson.
