Grip is very prevalent in Yarmouth. In some cases whole families are suffering from it. On Forest street, which numbers about 20 houses, nearly all have been invaded by the disease, and Cliff and Parade streets have numerous cases. Although some of the attacks have been quite severe, none have as yet proved fatal, the disease generally being of a mild type.

## Family Matters.

PIMPLE LOTION.—(Sir W. Knighton's receipt.) Half a drachm of spirits of potash and three ounces of spirits of wine; apply it to the pimples with a camel's-hair pencil. If this is too strong, add one half pure water to it.

CHAPPED HANDS.—Olive oil, one ounce; beeswax, half a drachm. Melt the wax in the oil with a gentle heat, and stir in a drachm of honey, and half a drachm of flowers of zinc. Rub briskly in, and wipe with a soft towel.

TO TAKE STAINS OUT OF SILK.—Mix together in a vial, two ounces of essence of lemon, and one ounce of oil of turpentine. Grease and other spots in silks are to be rubbed gently with a linen rag dipped in the above composition.

CORNS.—The following is said to be a certain cure for corns: Scrape a piece of common chalk; put a small portion of it upon the corn, and bind it with a linen rag. Repeat the application for a few days and you will find the corn come off like a shell.

TO ASCERTAIN WHETHER A ROOM IS DAMP OR NOT.—Place a weighed quantity of fresh lime in an open vessel in the room, and leave for 24 hours, carefully closing the windows and doors. At the end of the 24 hours re-weigh the lime, and if the increase exceeds one per cent. of the original weight, it is not safe to live in the room.

SCORCHED LINEN.—The following will restore scorched linen: Peel and slice two onions, and extract the juice by pounding and squeezing; add half an ounce of shred white soap, two ounces of fuller's earth, and half a pint of vinegar; boil together, and when cool spread it over the scorched linen and let it dry, then wash out the linen.

SOUSE.—Take pigs' ears and feet, clean them thoroughly, and then soak them in salt and water for several days. Boil them tender and split them; they are then good fried. If you wish to sous them when cold, turn boiling vinegar on them, and spice with pepper-corns and mace. Cloves improve the taste, but turn them a dark color. Add a little salt. They will keep good pickled for five or six weeks. Fry them in lard.

TO MAKE SCOURING BALLS.—Portable balls for removing spots from clothes may be thus prepared: Fuller's earth, perfectly dried (so that it crumbles into a powder), is to be moistened with the clear juice of lemons, and a small quantity of pure pearl ash is to be added. Knead the whole carefully together till it acquires the consistency of a thick elastic paste; form it into convenient small balls and dry them in the sun. To be used thus: First moisten the spot on the clothes with water, then rub it with the ball, and let the spot dry in the sun; after having
