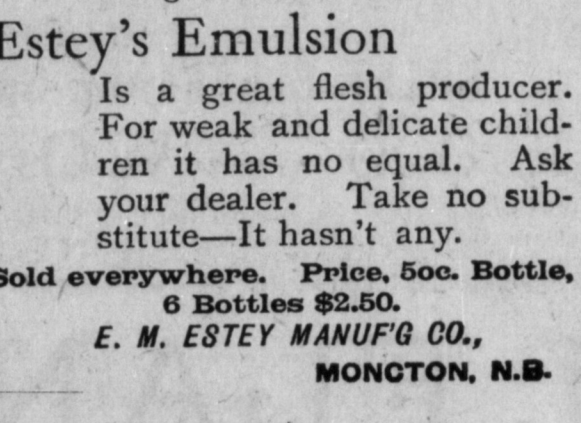

—Mr. and Mrs. Richard O'Leary and Mr. and Mrs. Geo. V. McInerney jointly gave a large party last Monday evening, before the advent of the Lenten season. More than thirty-five couples attended and kept two dance rooms occupied until the "wee sma' hours," when they left for their homes, declaring it the party of the season.

—Robert Marshall, of Boiestown, underwent a trying operation at the Victoria hospital on Friday afternoon last. The patient was lost in the woods a few days ago and his feet were badly frozen as a result. He was taken to the hospital where it was found necessary to amputate his feet. This was done by Dr. McLaren, assisted by Drs. Coburn, Currie and Van Wart. The patient is now doing well.—Gleaner.

—Our representative, Mr. Caie, recently paid a visit to the farm of Mr. Wm. Rogers, Bathurst Village. The proprietor has a splendid stock, consisting of registered Jerseys, Ayrshire and Grade Shorthorn cattle. He has twenty-three milch cows and forty young cattle; eighteen horses, including the celebrated six-year-old Hambeltonian stallion Redemption—registered under rule 6, the highest American standard. Redemption was sired by Redwood, dam Nellie F., and is a splendid specimen of horse flesh. Mr. Rogers' crop the past season consisted of 2,000 bushels of oats, 300 tons of hay, 2,500 bushels of turnips, 250 bushels of mangel wurzels, 1,300 bushels of potatoes, four acres of ensilage, four acres of peas, 300 bushels of buckwheat, besides smaller roots, etc.

—A correspondent writing from Harcourt Station, under the date of February 23, says:—The remains of Geo. W. Spencer, son of Robert Spencer, of Mill Branch, who was killed by a train on the Boston & Maine Railway last Thursday, arrived here to-day, accompanied by Mr. Adam Spencer, a brother of the deceased. It appears that there were four brothers all working in the same place in New Hampshire, and, in going home in the evening, were crossing a railway crossing, one train having just gone by, the men started to cross, three of them got over, and George, who was a little behind them, was struck by another train going in the opposite direction, being killed instantly. His head was completely separated from his body. There appears to have been some mismanagement on the part of the railway as the gates, which were closed when the first train went by, had been opened, a thing which should not have been done till both trains had passed.

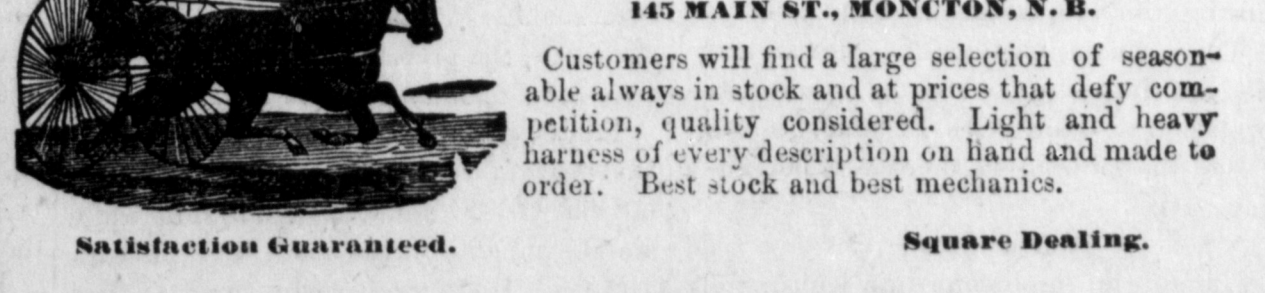
