CHARGED WITH SHEEP STEALING.—Marshall Foster, on complaint of Mr. W. Ross, agent at the Buctouche & Moncton station, to-day arrested Richard Gogan, of Richibucto, charged with stealing two carcasses of sheep and three lamb skins from the Buctouche & Moncton station in January, 1891. 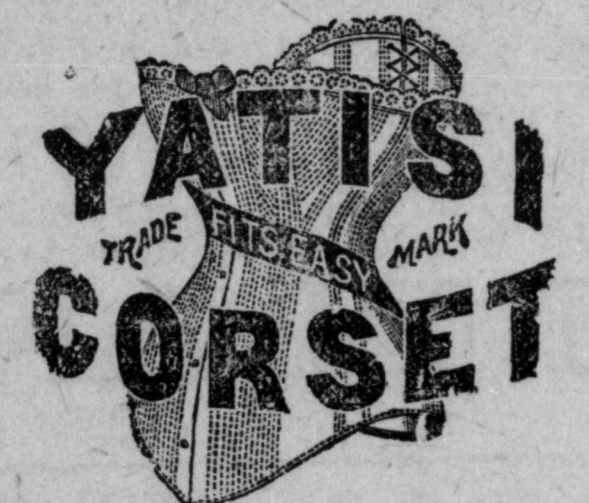
