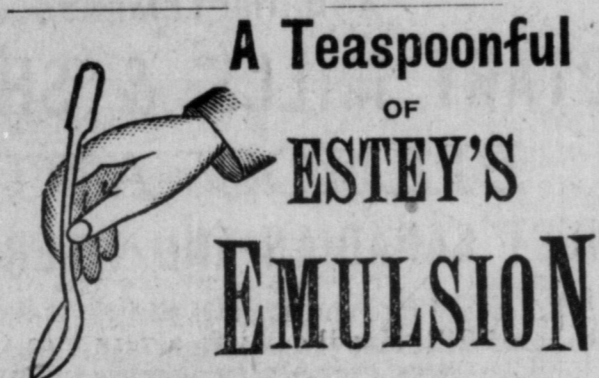

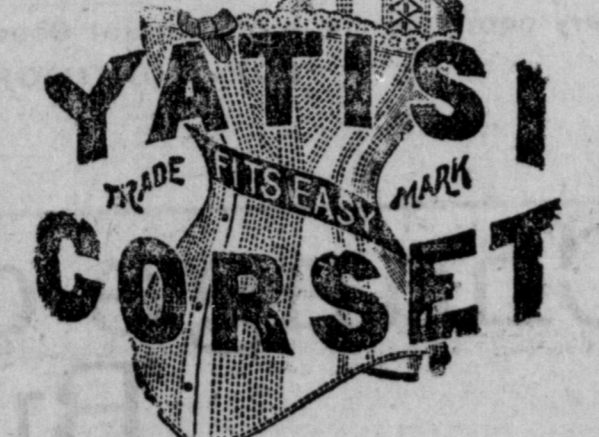

A portion of the district strongly objected to the site of the new building and the burning is supposed to be the work of fan incendiary. —Rev. John S. Allan, Methodist minister at Bathurst, has accepted a call from the Richibucto circuit to succeed Rev. J. Seller whose term expires in July. His acceptance is subject to the approval of the Methodist Conference. —Last Saturday morning, before the K. N. R. train had started for the Junction, the train hands lighted fires in the stoves of the passenger car and shunted it off on the siding until the train was made up. A short time afterwards smoke was noticed issuing from it and the car was discovered to be on fire. The alarm was given, and after hard work the fire was put out, but not until it had all but destroyed the interior of the car. The road has since been obliged to make a box car do service in its place. Mr. Brown expects to have it repaired in a few days. —Mr. James Miller, of Mortimore, has in his residence a laboratory and fine lantern. The views he throws on the screen are nearly all of his own taking.
