The Two Parties. Free traders—or Liberals—claim that all duties operate in exactly the same way; and hence, if an article which is produced here in large quantity is laid under duty, the consumers of that article are obliged to pay a heavy tax, only a small share of which reaches the national treasury, but goes into the pockets of rich manufacturers.

While, on the other hand, protectionists or Conservatives, claim that if duties are removed disaster would follow. They claim that only by partly or wholly shutting out foreign products can a large remunerative home product be maintained, that if this be not maintained a number of men cannot get employment or must work at very low wages.

As to the cost to the consumer, they claim that the foreign producer will of course get the best price he can, that a large home production makes sharper competition among our own producers than a small one, and gives the consumer lower prices and compels the foreign producer to sell at lower rates.

As to articles that cannot be produced here (such as tea and coffee) or that can only be partly produced here (as sugar) they advocate removing the duties entirely (and have already done it in one case by putting raw sugar on the free list) since their cost to the consumer cannot be reduced in any other way.
