Earthquakes in 1891.

The record of earthquake shocks kept at the Smithsonian institution in Washington shows that there have been more of them this year thus far than there were in any previous year of recent times. There have been numerous slight shocks in many parts of the country, and there have been heavier shocks in South America, Asia, Africa and the islands of the Pacific. When the earthquake record of the world for the year 1891 is made up at the end of December it will be long and elaborate.

EFFECT OF TOBACCO SMOKE. Recent experiments by M. Bourries, inspector of meat for Paris, reveals a great spector to try the effect of tabacco smoke on fresh meat. Some meat was exposed to the fumes of tabacco and afterward offered to a dog which had been deprived of food for twelve hours. The animal after smelling the meat refused to eat it. Some of the meat was then concealed within bread, which the dog devoured greedily, but in twenty minutes commenced to display the most distressing symptoms, and P. O. BOX 146, MONCTON, B. 
