When the earthquake record of the world for the year 1891 is made up at the end of December it will be long and elaborate.

EFFECT OF TOBACCO SMOKE.

Recent experiments by M. Bourries, inspector of meat for Paris, reveals a great danger and one that care should be taken to avoid. Cases of poisoning having resulted from eating meat which seemed perfectly wholesome, suggested to the inspector to try the effect of tobacco smoke on fresh meat. Some meat was exposed to the fumes of tobacco and afterward offered to a dog which had been deprived of food for twelve hours. The animal after smelling the meat refused to eat it. Some of the meat was then concealed within bread, which the dog devoured greedily, but in twenty minutes commenced to display the most distressing symptoms, and soon died in great agony.

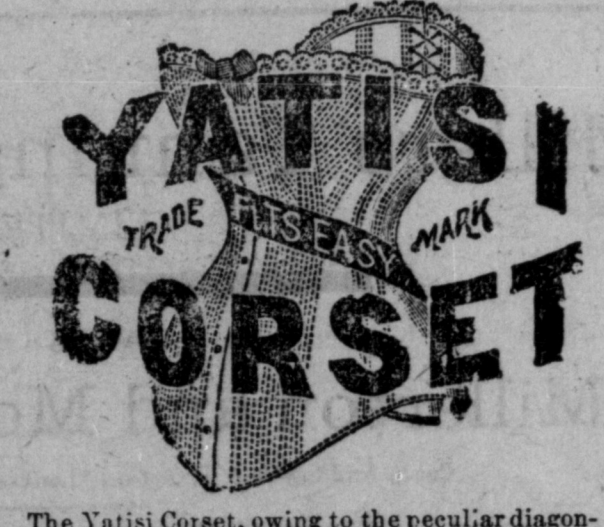

—Old Red Cloud, the notorious Sioux chief, is now living in disgrace and nearly blind. He still lingers around the Chadroneau agency, a wreck of his former self, and though still popular with his tribe seems to be neglected by all except his faithful old wife.

—A correspondent writes: "This is one of the most remarkable winters ever experienced by the residents of this county. Seals can be seen daily playing about in the open water of the river; geese are still here, and sea-gulls are as plentiful as in summer, yet not a crow has been seen all winter. They are usually here all winter."

—The wholesale grocery firm of McAfee & Loomer, Nos. 21 and 22 South Wharf, St. John, N. B., are doing a good business. A great advantage derived by small retail traders doing business with them is that they break packages while the larger wholesale merchants do not care to do so, thereby enabling small buyers at a very small advance to get the assortment they require without buying too largely.

—Mr. Martin Flanagan was informed by telegram on Saturday of the death of his uncle, Mr. George Flanagan, at Boston. The Boston Herald says:—"In the death of George Flanagan, Boston loses one of its oldest and most respected citizens. He was 76 years of age, and had been a resident of Boston for more than 50 years, during which time he conducted a clothing business. He leaves a wife, one daughter, and four grand children."
